MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS' PARTICIPATION.

1 MR. WECHSLER: Joan Hodowanitz. MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz, 2 3 resident and taxpayer. I'm not giving up on the 2014 audit. I still have not seen it 4 5 posted to the City's website. The city has had it since March 15 and if memory serves 6 today is May 4. I think that should be 7 8 posted to the website as soon as possible so 9 that citizens have a chance to view it other 10 than standing in the library or at the City Clerk's desk. 11 12 Has SB & Company scheduled an exit 13 briefing yet on the audit? 14 MR. WECHSLER: There is not an exit briefing scheduled but there is a 15 16 teleconference between myself, Mr. Evans and 17 Mr. Bulzoni and him. 18 MS. HODOWANITZ: Has a date been scheduled for that? 19 20 MR. WECHSLER: Yes, May 23. 21 MS. HODOWANITZ: And after that, 22 would you be able to give some information 23 to the public about the audit? 24 MR. WECHSLER: Hopefully. 25 MR. HODOWANITZ: Will you be able to

publish a summary in the Times-Tribune of the fiscal affairs for that year?

MR. WECHSLER: Hopefully. I have never done it before, I don't believe it's ever been done before so I'm not sure how it's going to work.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Well, a few days ago Newton Township and West Abington did theirs so you might take a look at what they published. Is there any information on when the mayor might deliver his 2016 state of the city address?

MR. WECHSLER: We have not heard anything yet.

MS. HODOWANITZ: Because the one last year was done on May 1 so we have hit the year point. Oh, I saw the article in the paper about the city is reconsidering the garbage fee. Just to make sure people feel really, really good about paying the garbage fee I live in the Forum. Now, the Forum is a nine story condo building, floors two to nine comprise 80 apartments, and the first floor has a number of commercial units, we pay a private waste hauler

annually, and our annual contract is \$4,800. So do the math and you figure out that we pay far less than what the average citizen pays for their trash hauling, and that includes recycling, too.

The Globe Store that the county has decided to buy and move into, does anybody got an idea of what was the city's portion of the tax revenue on that building?

MR. EVANS: The paper reported it was around \$108,000.

MS. HODOWANITZ: 108,000. I don't what anybody else thinks, but if I had to guess if the property on Adams Avenue is ever sold it will probably be sold to the University of Scranton. If that happens, it comes off the tax roles, so I don't think that's a -- I don't think that was a wise move at all.

And I saw the article in the paper on the Scranton Parking Authority looking at their challenges and changes, they were supposed to have had a meeting last night but it got cancelled, I'm not quite sure when it's going to be rescheduled, but when

you read in the article it appears that there is going to be a seven member board of directors created to oversee the parking assets after they are sold and Scranton is going to get two or three seats on that board and apparently the board is going to do things like set rates, budgets, decide on capital projects and the mayor's plan calls for in DC to lease the assets for up to 40 years and in return pay a undisclosed upfront fee to the city. I'm not quite sure, you know, how all of this is going to work out, but I'm getting a little tired of all of these undisclosed fees and haven't figured out what we are going to do with storm water and we don't know what the role of the third party administrator of the pension funds is going to be. I have a feeling, you know, that we are groping in the dark here in many ways. I think a lot of the citizens would like to know, you know, we have been discussing the Parking Authority for what two years since Mayor Courtright came into office? You ought to be closer to at least a ballpark figure of

what kind of money the city is going to get for this deal and we already know according to this article that parking rates are going to go up, the meter rates are going to go up, and they are going to standardize the garage rates between 90 and 132 dollars per month so more next week.

MR. WECHSLER: Albert Young.

MR. YOUNG: Good evening, gentlemen, 47 years of broken promises here. Two weeks ago Elaine and I were here to update the council about the Meadow Brook Creek problem that we have in our backyard. At that time we showed you an updated picture. picture showed a small increase in the size of the hole, a crater, by the way. last Friday afternoon Councilman Gaughan paid us a visit, and let me tell you his facial expression and his vocal expression tells it all. There is a problem and the picture does not show the problem and Saturday morning, the following day, we had a visit from a contractor that we have had out a couple of times and this firm had been recommended to us by Pace Construction to

give us a proposed estimate on repairs.

They actually walked into hole. The property next door on the upper side has they found an additional 20 feet of broken conduit. The one side of the conduit is totally broken away, the lid or the top has a big crack in it. These people were told then to not park their car as close as they have been.

Now, this is not only a health problem because of the stench of the former sewer runoff in there, it's a safety hazard because it's now getting to the point where every rainstorm we have it gets bigger and now because of everything it's an emergency situation. There is an old adage, the wheels of industry grind very slowly, but now from our eyes the political arena is moving in reverse. As you can see, 47 years of broken promises.

We are asking all involved, every politician that's involved, city, state, local, whatever, to get involved and find emergency funds to fix this problem ASAP. This is a problem that is not going to go

away unless we get emergency monies to fix the hole.

Now, lately, and I'm going back as far as last Thursday or Friday it was brought to my attention that back in 1991 former council signed a resolution and Mr. Pocius, his name is on that resolution to repair this conduit in it's entirety after phase one was finished they gave a resolution that was supposed to have given them two years to get themselves together and finish this project. Well, here we are 25 years later and need I say more.

Now, my wife and I sat in an attorney's office this morning to find out what can be done, should be done, and I really do not want to drop \$3,500 for legal fees to sue whomever is involved and I don't think the city wants a problem like this either. We are asking help from you folks to get this thing and expedite it yesterday. Not tomorrow, yesterday.

We are also asking that the rest of council and the legal team here and the reporter come out and visit and see what we

are talking about. This is a problem. Α big problem and, please, come out. really, really would like somebody to visit and see what's going on out there. Until you see it for yourself, and thank God Tom Welby is here, he can vouch for whatever we have been saying right along, he is the only one that I can honestly say other than now Bill Gaughan has really inspected this property. I need help, we need help, and our next door neighbor is going to need help. We are talking about 60 feet of conduit at this point between the two property. Thank you, gentlemen.

MR. EVANS: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Robert Bergman.

MR. BERGMAN: Thank you for listening to me. I occupy the second half of the home at 1713-1715 Wyoming Avenue. My wife and I have lived there, raised our family, our children and our grandchildren visit for 41 years. Well, at least 40, maybe 45 years, 45 years. When we first moved in back in June of '71 there was a hole in the backyard. We called the city

and Al Magnotta at that time sent someone out, city workers, and they put a plate and that plate is still intact. It's 45 years later. For decades things were okay, but now the same situation has deteriorated further. Areas over the last couple of the years have opened up. We have a hole. It's now a huge hole. A child, person, a motorcycle, pets, can fall into the hole.

We are not asking for a project we are just asking that the current situation be dealt with, be repaired. It's an It's serious and going on for emergency. The city under two different administrations sent DPW people out. These people came out and they put plants and they put metal areas over the hole and the situation was good. It was a Band-Aid, everyone knew it was a Band-Aid but we appreciated it. A couple of years ago you guys came out. A year or so later they came out because the hole kept getting bigger and the steel coverings began to recede into the hole.

So that we have a situation now

where there is a nothing that can be done Band-Aid wise, nothing to cover, it's too big. It's got to be repaired from the inside out and that would take a certain amount of time. It's not a big project. We are not talking millions of dollars for the whole neighborhood, we are talking one property, the neighboring property and people that looked at it they have indicated probably a week, seven days, they are giving estimates so that if you gentlemen saw the area, whether you did anything or not, you would realize it is an emergency, it's serious and it's dangerous.

When it rains heavily it floods and the water erodes the area. Sometimes the water cops up and it goes into our basement if it rains heavily. It's no fun getting up at 2 or 3 o'clock in the morning after a rainstorm hoping that the gas is not leaking the electricity is not in jeopardy, we have done that, I have done that. We wait for the rain to stop, I go downstairs, woof, okay, no problem today, no fire, no gas, see what happens. Light rain is no problem.

Heavy rain is a disaster and it can be life-threatening to us living there.

I saw a ferret come out one day and that's kind of cute, and I said to my wife -- we saw a ferret. I said, "Next time we saw rats in backyard we will go out the front door."

We don't own the property. It's not our house but it is our home. We have been there 45 years and we care about this and we have nothing gained from what you guys do except peace of mind in our home where, as I said, we raised our family and we plan on staying, but the thought of animals, rodents coming out is a health issue and it's serious problem.

So I'm asking that something be done to deal with this immediate individual particular problem confronting the two properties, the 1713 and 1715 Wyoming Avenue. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mrs. Reed, could you please see if we could contact the administration and contact them to see if they can do an emergency declaration for

just the repair? When this conversation started earlier this year, we heard huge numbers for the total project that was going to require the city to have a significant amount of cash to put in the project, for the whole project, so in this instance perhaps maybe we could request if an emergency declaration could be made by the administration for just a temporary repair for this place now. I understand there was estimates, are there any dollar amounts that you -- any dollar amounts that you have heard yet?

MR. BERGMAN: I don't have that because I'm not the owner. The owner probably has that information because he spoke directly to a -- few people speak to me, I'm simply a tenant.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Young, if you have an estimate would you drop it off?

MR. YOUNG: As soon as I get the estimate I will drop it off. I fully expected to have it tonight but, fortunately, I did not get it and I will make copies for everyone. What they did say

one they were out we talking about 50 to 75 1 2 thousand dollars for approximately 60 feet 3 of repair. MR. WECHSLER: So we'll request and 4 see if an emergency declaration can be made 5 for this project without having an impact on 6 any, you know, worsening the problem down 7 8 the line or impacting the potential -- the 9 larger project, that's also we don't want to 10 throw good money after bad but if it's 11 something we can do a emergency certificate 12 and get some relief we will pursue that. 13 MR. YOUNG: That's all I'm asking is 14 a repair until we get the whole situation remedied down the road. 15 16 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. MR. YOUNG: Thank you. 17 18 MR. WECHSLER: Les Spindler. 19 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening, 20 Council. Les Spindler, city resident and 21 homeowner and taxpayer. President Wechsler, 22 what was the reason Councilman Gaughan 23 couldn't make it tonight? 24 MR. WECHSLER: He had a family 25 situation.

MR. SPINDLER: Oh, okay. Well, I hope everything is okay because it seems kind of convenient because last night I received a phone call, if you go on Facebook and if people want to look at it themselves they can go to Lackawanna County and Beyond and when you go on there you see a video of Councilman Gaughan.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Spindler, I would like to stop you there because I'm not sure if that's been proven or not.

MR. SPINDLER: Well, I saw it with my other two eyes and so did many other people who have seen it already.

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ WECHSLER: I think that's your opinion.

MR. SPINDLER: Pictures don't lie.

Anyway, I will address this when he is back here and I just think in my own opinion it's totally inappropriate for an elected official to act that way. I will discuss it face-to-face when he is here.

Back to something I have spoken about for years and years the garbage fee.

I did see it already in the paper that the

city is looking into maybe lowering or waiving it, as I have said for years I think it's illegal and should be done away with. The reason it was instated in the first place was to pay off the tipping fees and I saw in the paper the other day where he had by the end of this year the tipping fees will be paid off so I don't see any reason why we need a garbage fee of any reason of Whether it's per bag or a hundred dollars or whatever. If the tipping fee is paid off we shouldn't need a garbage fee. We pay our property taxes for that. shouldn't have to pay any more to get our garbage picked up. So hopefully this will be ended by the end of the year.

Next thing paving, which I've been speaking about for awhile, and I brought this up, Luzerne Street, it's getting worse by the minute and I think the utility or whoever dug it up should be responsible to repair that. That's one of the main thoroughfares in the city, it's highly traveled ever day and it's a mess.

MR. ROGAN: We have been in contact

with the utility, a number of us on council have been and, unfortunately, they don't answer to us the way the DPW would, but we keep pushing the issue with them, and I don't even drive on Luzerne Street, I take a different road just because it's so bad and with all the rain we had over the last week it has gotten even worse.

MR. SPINDLER: I think these utilities are totally out of control. are digging up streets, they don't repair them correctly when they are done. driving down Rebecca Avenue the other day, and I forget what block it is, it was just newly paved I saw for length of the block two cuts and they were going to dig up the whole street the length of the street. This is ridiculous. You mean to tell me they didn't know that they were going to dig it up before it was paved? They are out of control and they are ruining the streets of this city. Something has got to be done with these utilities.

Lastly, I was away for a weekend attending a happy occasion, my daughter

MR. JACKOWITZ: You can use Luzerne Street, Pat, it's been paved.

Okay, garbage fees seems to be a very popular subject tonight. The garbage fee, somebody really needs to look into because 300 bucks is a lot of money. other areas probably pay more but, you know, per bag and whatever, but, you know, that's supposed to be paid out of our taxes. That's what people pay taxes for. That's a public service picking up the garbage, DPW, plus it was only going to be for the tipping fees and that should be done this year so let's hope somebody really looks into that seriously and does something about it and maybe either eliminate it completely or reduce it to a nominal fee of some sort, you know, that the city can survive on because I don't know, I just don't think it's right. I don't know if it's legal or illegal, but I don't think it's right at all.

Okay, basically -- oh, what questions and problems can the citizens of Scranton come to city council with and ask for an answer to these questions so we can,

you know, maybe solve this problem that we have had for years with people coming up asking questions and never getting answers and so on and so forth? You know, and as far as letters, Right-to-Know letters, they are almost useless because it could take six months to a year to get an answer if you ever get an answer so if we can find out what questions city council can actually answer and, you know, what problem areas you as a city, as a legislative body actually deal with so that the speakers will have a better idea of what they can ask and what they shouldn't ask, you know, so if someone can work on that and maybe --

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Jackowitz, all of the questions that are made are to us and to get back and referred back to the administration, actually there is very few questions that are directly answered, that can be answered by city council because a lot of the specific details come from the administration so if the administration isn't forthcoming to us it's difficult for us to provide you with the answers.

1 Right, I understand MR. JACKOWITZ: 2 That's what I'm trying to say, what 3 questions can we ask? Can we just ask 4 questions on legislation and that's it? 5 MR. WECHSLER: We try to answer all 6 of the questions that we can, but there are 7 some questions that require further details 8 from the administration and we don't have 9 them. 10 MR. EVANS: Certainly legislation is 11 something we should be able to answer for 12 you, but preceding business is open for 13 auestion. 14 MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, so it's open 15 for a question but maybe not an answer; 16 right? 17 MR. EVANS: Well, we certainly try 18 to get the answer, yeah. 19 MR. JACKOWITZ: Okay, I'm getting a 20 little ahead of myself here, just in case 21 this happens to become a possibility in 22 Scranton and in Lackawanna County because I 23 see a lot of Lackawanna County 24 representatives here tonight, these unisex 25 bathrooms, you know, that they are trying to

pass now where people who have had sex changes can have the option of which bathroom they want it use, that possibly may come to Pennsylvania some day or many come to Scranton, well, if it does I hope the legislation that is passed is that you use the bathroom that your equipment downstairs requires, okay? Because it's getting out of hand. I mean, you know, so just keep that in mind in case you guys are still on city council when it comes up. Just keep that in mind, okay? I a appreciate that.

MR. WECHSLER: I can't wait until we deal with issues like that.

MR. EVANS: Appreciate the words of the wise. I appreciate that.

MR. WECHSLER: Tom Welby.

MR. WELBY: That's a tough act to follow.

MR. WECHSLER: That could have been you, Tom.

MR. WELBY: Tom Welby, 119 Park

Drive in Scranton, but first I'm here on

behalf of the state representative Marty

Flynn and, Mr. President, I don't mean to be

piling on with, but I have probably have questions here that with all due respect council can't directly answer but if you would pursue the questions we would appreciate it and that is Representative Flynn is asking me to be here to ask in particular some answers to questions on this serious dilemma facing our neighbors in Greenridge.

First, regarding the September 4 incident with that horrible stench leaving black fluid passed through the Greenridge and Dunmore neighborhood, while the landfill was ruled out as the source of that issue it that's just not enough of an answer for any of us and I know that it's not enough of an answer for you as well. We still really need to know where did it come from, what has been done and what is being done to prevent it from happening in the future.

Secondly, regarding the Monahan

Avenue Reeve Street line, the line that is used as an alternative for leachate, supposedly every now and then leachate could travel down through this line when there is

a problem with the dedicated line. We have been told that it has happened. Until we have answers to all of the questions, all of the questions that are asked by the Greenridge Neighborhood Association we respectfully ask that if the dedicated sanitary sewer line is dedicated for the use of leachate is not able to carry the volume of leachate produced at the landfill then all of that volume is to be held back until the dedicated line is able to safely transport that fluid for the use of whatever it takes to meet that and whether it be a retention area or whatever it might be. also ask that access to that Monahan Avenue Reeve Street line be terminated and that it not be allowed to transport any leachate or any usage whatsoever.

Now, if I can put my Tom Welby hat on for just a moment. Two things, one regarding the young family and all of the other residents out on Penn Avenue along Meadow Brook Creek area it's a horrible problem that they are dealing with and any one of us if we had that problem, a big hole

like that that literally a car can fit in our back yards if he we had that going on for a couple of months I think we would be pretty upset. I have paperwork in Representative Flynn's Office that goes back to Representative Gaynor Cawley from 1994 when they were dealing with that issue and it still isn't resolved.

I was over there a few weeks ago and I was trying to help them pull out some shrubs that were hanging literally 830 percent of the shrub was falling into the hole and we tried to pull it out and save it, save one shrub for him, when all of the rest of them had fallen in. I was standing there the edge of the sidewalk gave way and I fell in, but it's just not a safe issue, and I don't think kids have changed from when I was a little younger, kids go running through yards and it's just a horrible possibility of a tragedy happening there and we just can't allow that possibility to exist.

I have think if it came to it if a tragedy did occur even though the city

hasn't been involved in repairing that, I have been told that they don't -- there is hesitation of getting involved because once you become involved you then accept responsibility for that situation. suggest we are already responsible here in the city. If something happens out there, a tragedy were to happen the city is aware of that problem and the fact that the city hasn't been able to do anything about it the city, of course, is going to be held liable for that and hopefully maybe we can work together with the Sewer Authority on that, it has the resources, it has the experience and the knowledge to be able to handle that situation, and if perhaps you can work something out with the Sewer authority to help get that done and get the temporary Band-Aid fixed until the bigger problem develop can be addressed for the whole project.

The one last thing, the garbage bag
fee that's being proposed if you would
please consider not instituting the bag fee.
I, as well as every single one of you I

know, participates in a lot of cleanups. I have been participating in cleanups with every one of you here and that kind of work is really appreciated, but if you would go to a per bag fee you know what's going to happen, all the alleys, the less traveled streets, along the trails and along the rivers we have all worked so hard to clean up they are going to be strewn with bags from people that aren't going to pay that dollar fee or whatever it is for that per bag fee. They will chose to throw away on the sides of our roads instead.

I ask instead that you consider further enforcement of the apartments for multiple residences in buildings that perhaps are only being charged for one of them. I know some houses, and we all know where there is four or five dwellings in one building and they are probably only paying one, if that, so if we can consider that instead. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Welby, just
please one minute. We welcome
Representative Flynn's efforts to become

involved in this issue. City council has been working on this since initially when the smell was first detected back in the fall. Perhaps we could enlist him to get some answers from the Department of Environmental Protection. They are the ones that issued the study. I would be happy to work with Mr. Flynn and see if we could set up a meeting between him and myself and anyone else from city council who would like to become involved.

MR. WELBY: He would like, and with all due respect to that state agency, perhaps a public forum with them invited here we would love to join you at that and I suspect Senator Blake's would also join you here if perhaps -- would that be acceptable if our office --

MR. WECHSLER: Do you think
Representative Flynn would arrange that? We haven't had much success with that.

MR. WELBY: We definitely will.

MR. WECHSLER: In addition, we have been in contact with our city solicitor

Jason Shrive about getting information about

his legal opinion on the status of the dedicated line that was protected a long time ago so earlier we have already fought this fight, we don't want to fight it again so I also would encourage Representative Flynn in becoming actively in our efforts, also, to get that letter.

We also contacted Attorney Shrive this week to set up a meeting with myself and Mr. Gaughan and members of Friends of Lackawanna, also, to get some answers so I am really encouraged to see that Representative Flynn wants to become involved with this because really for right now, as you can see tonight, city council is the place where everyone is coming for to answer it and, unfortunately, we can only stir pot, we can't provide the answers or the remedy right now that everyone desires so I welcome -- I welcome Rep Flynn's involvement.

Okay, if it's okay with MR. WELBY: council then is all right if I work with Ms. Reed and invite them to a public forum here?

want to get Senator Blake, Senator Farina, whoever, because like I said city council has kind of been out on this limb since September. We welcome anybody with the effort.

MR. EVANS: Tom, to give you an update where we are we requested Attorney Shrive to give us an opinion on the settlement and he kicked it down the road to the Sewer Authority for an opinion by their solicitor and that's where we are right now. He doesn't want to render his decision or opinion until he gets one from the Sewer Authority, but we are not going to wait forever. The neighbors over there deserve much better than that. We have a settlement that we think should be still in effect and it's being violated and we want to get in front of a judge at some point in time to say why it's being violated and if it's being violated what are the recourses, so I think we are that close, I think we are close to getting something done on this thing, but I think you are right that they have some sort of public caucus or a session

with all of the stakeholders in addition to the elected officials it would go a long way to moving this forward.

MR. WECHSLER: Okay. Good. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: We appreciate that.

Anything -- we have kind of been on our own here so any assistance from higher ups would be great.

MR. WELBY: Okay. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Pat Clark.

MR. CLARK: Good evening.

Mr. Welby, I'd just like to update on your thoughts and holdings of leachate up there, the information we have is that Keystone Landfill has lagoons up there with the capacity to hold 11 million tons of leachate. They discharge about 80,000 gallons a day, so they have a capacity -- I'm sorry, gallons. They have a capacity to hold 11 million tons on site, they discharge 80,000 tons a day. They don't ever need to use them.

We have been on this landfill issue for a couple of -- almost two years now and

we appreciate the time that you all have given us in terms of the leachate issue as concerned as well, one of my questions I just wanted to clarify, Attorney Minora, last time you were here I was unclear on your reason that you did not want to issue an opinion, can you clarify that for me?

MR. MINORA: Beg your pardon? I didn't hear you.

MR. CLARK: A couple of meetings ago you felt that you weren't in the position to render an opinion on this matter, I was unclear as to why, that meaning was unclear, can you clarify that for me, please?

MR. MINORA: A couple of reasons.

First of all, my opinion has no enforceable power for the city. It doesn't bind the city to anything, it would be my personal opinion. I have a number of documents available to me and I think I could look a those and come to some conclusions, but they would be my conclusions and mine only and so they add nothing to the dialogue, they don't help council in any way, which is my job.

MR. CARTER: What types of issues

1 would you issue opinions on if not something like this? 2 3 MR. MINORA: Beg your pardon? MR. CARTER: What types of issues 4 5 would you issue an opinion on if not something like this? 6 7 MR. MINORA: I give opinions to 8 council on questions that they raise that 9 involve legislation. This is a question 10 about litigation. This council cannot 11 litigate on behalf of the city. MR. CARTER: Understood. 12 13 MR. MINORA: The only person who can 14 bring litigation on behalf of the city is the city solicitor. 15 16 MR. CARTER: Correct. 17 MR. MINORA: So I am usurping his 18 authority by giving opinions on litigation 19 so that's not my job. That's actually what 20 I should not do. 21 MR. CARTER: Okay, we can agree to 22 disagree on whether or not that's usurping, 23 my question is, Councilman Evans, you had 24 mentioned updates, we got an update today as 25 well, or yesterday from Attorney Shrive

requested meetings with you guys, we met in February, to set the stage on timing, we are now in May. You all asked Attorney Shrive for his opinion, he then for some reasons asked SSA for documents, which he can get himself and their opinion, we know SSA's opinion on this matter. They, in fact, issued their opinion is clear, there is no question that we can do it, we did it. asked for a meeting then, as you just alluded to with him as well, and his response was not for a meeting, he said, "Well, put all your findings in writing as well and let me know and then I'll deliberate and issue my opinion on that."

It's odd, he is acting as though -and I don't him personally at all, he is
acting although he is a judge, he wants
people to submit briefs and then he'll -- -

MR. WECHSLER: We did ask him for his opinion so he needs to collect the information so I don't have as much problem with as you do because if you want his opinion he needs to get all of the facts.

MR. CLARK: But he gets the fact

himself. He is the looking for everyone else to write opinions and then he'll summarize that. We got that letter yesterday.

MR. WECHSLER: I don't want to get in an argument here, a request was made for us to get an opinion from Solicitor Shrive.

MR. CLARK: Right.

MR. WECHSLER: We did that.

MR. CLARK: Correct.

MR. WECHSLER: We are pursuing that opinion.

MR. CLARK: Excuse me?

MR. WECHSLER: We are pursuing that opinion.

MR. CLARK: Right. My question is pushing forward on the time, you mentioned you are getting close on -- we are a couple of months in from the start, I know he got it a couple of weeks ago. The letters seem to about a two-week pace here. I'm thrilled we are pursuing a resolution on this or at least an opinion, do we have a timeline on that or is it just open?

MR. WECHSLER: It's open.

MR. CLARK: So really it's political 1 2 ping pong that is playing; right? 3 MR. WECHSLER: Well, it's not political ping ponging --4 5 MR. CLARK: Not by you, by them. MR. WECHSLER: No, but the thing is 6 you came and asked us to do something and we 7 8 did it so your comments to us about 9 Solicitor Shrive should be placed to him. 10 We will listen to your --MR. CLARK: We did, but he won't 11 12 meet, he wants a written opinion so my 13 question is have there been an indicated 14 timeline on which he will --MR. WECHSLER: No, there has not 15 16 been. 17 MR. CLARK: Are you willing to put a timeline forth and say, "We would like this 18 19 by whatever." 20 MR. WECHSLER: We can set any 21 timeline we want, but it has no constraint 22 on him. We can't make him come to a 23 meeting. 24 MR. CLARK: Are you taking their 25 opinion at it's face value or is that --

MR. EVANS: Well, we haven't seen his opinion yet so we'll see what it says.

MR. CLARK: Regardless of what it comes down to is council getting any opinion themselves at all or is Attorney Shrive's opinion?

MR. WECHSLER: We've looked at all of this ourselves, we have our opinions as well, but as Solicitor Minora said we are not allowed to initiate litigation.

MR. CLARK: Correct. Just one last question then just so I'm clear is there a time soon which you will put a date in writing and say can we have this opinion by a firm date because if not it will go forever.

MR. WECHSLER: Again, we amongst ourselves discuss setting a date and go from there, but we don't have any pressure to make him go through with that.

MR. EVANS: We'll talk about that, I think that's appropriate to do that, but again, as Council President Wechsler said, they don't have to adhere to that date but I have no problem putting a hard date on it

1 for an answer. 2 MR. CLARK: Thank you. 3 MR. EVANS: You're welcome. MR. WECHSLER: Ruth Burke. 4 5 MS. BURKE: Good evening, thank you. Ruth Burke. I really just a follow-up again 6 7 on the same topic that I spoke about last 8 week, has there been any idea along with the 9 garbage fee about promoting recycling, which 10 plays into that issue that I think is part 11 of the City's responsibility to promote 12 recycling to avoid maybe the overall cost 13 for sending -- the City sending garbage. 14 MR. ROGAN: We did get a list in our mailbox and I plan on reading this under my 15 16 comments. 17 MS. BURKE: Is that from Lackawanna 18 County? 19 MR. ROGAN: It is, with all of the 20 items that are permissible and those that 21 aren't. 22 MS. BURKE: Yeah, and as I 23 understand it the county has that policy and 24 I know the city then each, each borough or 25 city, determines what they pick up at the

curb, but on top of that I think the city should do something.

MR. WECHSLER: Yeah, this year we did-- we hired a recycling coordinator and we also are working with a consultant this year in developing recycling to improve our recycling because we understand how much we are not doing.

MS. BURKE: Right. I mean, the motivation to have a lower garbage fee, part of that is to understand that if you recycle more your garbage fee, you know, in some of proposals might be less, you know.

MR. EVANS: Absolutely.

MR. WECHSLER: Definitely.

MS. BURKE: I find that important.

MR. ROGAN: One of the big problems, also, is televisions. I know I've noticed it in my neighborhood, I'm sure many of you have, also. Our DPW cannot pick up televisions.

MS. BURKE: Well, they were free to go to the Recycling Center until the end of the month.

MR. ROGAN: Right, and I know I

believe --

MS. BURKE: Last month.

MR. ROGAN: And I know, I believe
Representative Flynn's office did do a
recycling drive for TV's. Marywood also has
for electronics, but electronics something
that this is a new issue, you know, because
they used to be able to put them in the
dump, they used to be able to go the
Recycling Center and now that's changed so
that's an emerging issue as well. You know,
the last thing we want to see is people
smashing up TV's and putting them in the
waste.

MS. BURKE: And then, of course, I'm just, again, telling you that my position and my neighbors of supporting the efforts to get this issue with the change in this Sewer Authority agreement, it should have been really done much sooner than this letter two weeks ago, you know. It really is something that the city residents feel very strongly about.

MR. WECHSLER: And I don't know if you can answer this, is the same efforts

being made on Dunmore council? I mean, we are doing it, but I haven't seen anywhere we there has been any pressure on Dunmore council for this issue and I just if anybody can answer me later on.

MS. BURKE: Well, I mean, we were the Greenridge Neighborhood Association where this conversation started.

MR. WECHSLER: I know some of the members of Dunmore, but to be honest with you really right now Scranton City Council is in the lead on this and until tonight when Representative Flynn sent Mr. Welby here we haven't heard from anyone else, so we would be happy and encourage anyone who wants to participate with us.

MS. BURKE: And, of course, the petition was based on the fact that the city council was named in the agreement.

MR. WECHSLER: We understand that it's a city issue, also, but, you know, when we attended the session "Let's Stop Trash" it was more of a regional issue and I really would like it to be a regional issue because this stuff starts off in Dunmore or Throop

or wherever it starts off at and when the landfill, if it expands, is going to more of it, so we don't mind running with the ball, but, boy, we would sure like some support from some other municipalities, and from other elected officials as well.

MR. EVANS: Especially in Dunmore who has a strong council form of government so they can make decisions that we can't make, but they would be a big help.

MS. BURKE: Well, I mean, what's the venue, what's the avenue that citizens can contact the mayor and get a response? I mean, is there a -- does he have a website that he takes?

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, the mayor's phone number is in the book and he has an e-mail as well.

MS. BURKE: Maybe that's our next move --

MR. WECHSLER: I would say an additional move -- I'm sorry, I didn't mean to cut you off. Like I said, we have been doing this here and I'm getting a little blow back that we are not trying hard

1 enough, but right now we are the only one 2 that's trying. 3 MS. BURKE: Right. Just voicing my 4 support. 5 MR. WECHSLER: So got to put a little bit more pressure there is two state 6 7 reps in this area, there is a state senator, 8 there is Dunmore, there is Throop, there is 9 a lot of elected officials that aren't being 10 pressured as we are. We are responding to 11 the pressure, we are doing it, but, boy, I 12 sure would love any support from anybody. 13 MS. BURKE: Well, I appreciate your 14 effort. Thank you. MR. EVANS: To contact the 15 16 administration www.Scrantonpa.gov. 17 MS. BURKE: Okay, thank you. 18 MR. EVANS: There should be 19 information on there about how to contact 20 the mayor's office. 21 MR. WECHSLER: Is there anyone else who would like to address council? 22 23 MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, 24 citizen of Scranton. Fellow Scrantonians, 25 well, your 7-B is coming up again, the

borrowing of 80 plus million plus not knowing a lot of things that go with that agreement, I know some people were supposed to continue to be paid for the life of the agreement, which I don't I didn't quite understand it because you know there is a -- (unintelligible) at it's best so a lot of that just went by the wind I guess you might say, but that did stick to me.

The other thing that stuck to me was the two bond issues that were like 8 percent or 9 percent what exactly was the percentage on them two bond issues that you want to repay?

MR. WECHSLER: That is the ceiling on the interest rate, 8 percent.

MR. SBARAGLIA: No, I'm talking about the bond issues that are in effect today?

MR. EVANS: The PNC.

MR. SBARAGLIA: That you are going to redeem them?

MR. EVANS: Yes, that's a variable rate so I think it was three and a half to four right now.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Three and a half to four percent?

MR. EVANS: Variable rate, but the bigger problem with that is PNC does not want to renew it so it may be a moot point.

MR. SBARAGLIA: I realize that. The fact that we are going to be borrowing around 6 or 7 percent.

MR. EVANS: Well, if we are borrowing 7 percent it's a dead deal.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Then I don't know why we would want to turn them bonds in if we are paying a lower rate on them, that doesn't make common sense, but the city doesn't make common sense.

But, anyway, that's another problem, and the bigger problem is if the mayor gets that \$9 million before the end of the year and pays the bond issue our city employees this year is going to cost us over \$200 million. Do you think we are getting the best money for our payment? 200 million is a lot of money to spend on public employees either for their pensions or I'm not even considering their pay, this year's pay, I'm

just saying what we are spending total on the public employees. I think 200 million is a lot. I don't know how you can sit with a straight face, I would have been in that mayor's office every darn day telling them how much of that 95 million can be used to pay off the Court awards and how much will be placed into the pension fund instead of doing what you are doing, but that would make sense and you don't make sense. only person that really made sense coming to council was the kid wanting to legalize pot because, believe me, if we all become potheads then we would agree with the way the city is being run. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. AMICO: I'm Vince Amico from

Dunmore, Dunmore councilman. Mr. Wechsler,

I just have one thing I'd like to clear up,

you said you were looking for help from

Dunmore, Throop, other municipalities and

I'm not just confused as to -- I was paying

attention, but I might have missed what you

are actually looking for.

MR. WECHSLER: Yeah, I'm not sure if

1 anyone has gone to Dunmore Council and asked these same questions, has anyone done that? 2 3 MR. AMICO: Well, correct me if I'm wrong, but the issue that we're --4 5 MR. WECHSLER: I agree with you. What I'm saying is. 6 7 MR. AMICO: No, because we are 8 not -- Dunmore is not a party in that -- we 9 weren't a party in that agreement so the 10 issue --MR. WECHSLER: But the --11 12 MR. AMICO: -- we are here for is 13 between the City of Scranton, Keystone and 14 the Sewer Authority. MR. WECHSLER: 15 I agree. 16 MR. AMICO: Dunmore has no thing to 17 do with this. 18 MR. WECHSLER: But the more voices 19 commenting on it I think --20 MR. AMICO: I agree. Personally I 21 don't think people even know that they were 22 wrong -- the people of Greenridge feel and 23 believe that they were, you know, taken 24 advantage of in this situation. 25 MR. WECHSLER: But to me for the

sake of one block from Greenridge Street, this side is Scranton, this side is Dunmore.

MR. AMICO: Right, I agree with that.

MR. WECHSLER: So I don't think the leadership of Dunmore is as concerned about it as we are. That's all.

MR. AMICO: I'm with you on that one, but as far as us, as far as people of Dunmore I don't think they feel as if they were -- I don't even think they know what's going on as much as the residents of Greenridge because Greenridge is originally who initiated this issue 20 years ago.

MR. WECHSLER: Sure.

MR. AMICO: And now they feel as if they are being taking advantage of if something happened without their --

MR. PERRY: I think Mr. Wechsler's point is Dunmore is part of the Sewer Authority which kind of puts us in the same boat with the Sewer Authority being involved, the City of Scranton being involved, and Keystone being involved.

MR. AMICO: Correct.

MR. PERRY: So, again, we are just looking for, you know, the more heads at the table the better.

MR. AMICO: Okay. Sounds good.

Thank you for your time. I appreciate it.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher.

First, could you give me, I guess,

Mr. Wechsler, what the current status of the

rental registration program is and what we

are going to -- it's going to come to

resolution?

MR. WECHSLER: Well, Councilman

Evans will give you more input on that, but
right now we are trying to put legislation
together.

MR. EVANS: Yeah, there is a draft that's completed and Attorney Minora is reviewing the draft. Once he reviews the draft we will be ready to go.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. And then, also, if you recall last December you said that we could \$75 million, which is what the mayor apparently is intending to put towards the pensions would bring us to the 50 percent level of funding, what would

1 the MMO be next year at 50 percent? MR. EVANS: Well, I'm not sure where 2 3 you getting the 75 million that the mayor said he was going to put into the pensions. 4 5 Well, he said he MS. SCHUMACHER: 6 was going to come up -- okay, roughly \$95 7 million and he said he is going to take 20 8 to pay off --9 MR. EVANS: Some higher earning 10 debt. 11 MS. SCHUMACHER: And so that leaves 12 75. 13 MR. EVANS: I'll be honest with you, 14 from my perspective none of that has been decided as far as what money is going where. 15 16 He can tell us all he wants and he can, you 17 know, may read something in the paper, but I 18 have not been privy to any conversation 19 about the money going into pensions and how 20 much. 21 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, but if we 22 were at the 50 percent level would the MMO 23 be? 24 MR. EVANS: I'll check and see if we 25 can find out if we get to 50 percent.

1 MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you. And has council yet invited Mayor Courtright to a 2 3 council meeting to answer our questions on the Sewer Authority assets sale? 4 5 MR. WECHSLER: We are still waiting for the details, the final details for 6 7 ourselves. 8 MS. SCHUMACHER: Final details of 9 what? 10 MR. WECHSLER: The Sewer agreement. MS. SCHUMACHER: Well, you have the 11 12 agreement; right? MR. WECHSLER: It hasn't been 13 14 finalized yet. MS. SCHUMACHER: It was voted on, 15 16 yeah, it was finalized. 17 MR. WECHSLER: But it's not --18 MS. SCHUMACHER: No, that was voted 19 on. 20 MR. ROGAN: Council role, as was 21 mentioned, is just to dissolve the 22 authority. Our biggest role is what you 23 talked about previously if there are --if it 24 goes through as to how to spend the proceeds 25 as Mr. Evans mentioned. That hasn't been

determined yet.

MR. WECHSLER: Actually, today we received a correspondence from the county and we are setting up a meeting with Mr. Wallace to explain those details to us.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, do you have a date for that?

MR. WECHSLER: Sometime next week.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Next week. Okay, before the meeting next week or after?

MR. WECHSLER: I'm not sure. I'm going to be out of town the next two days so it depends on when we can get together and we do have other things on our plate as well.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Then 307 South, remember we talked about deep depression on the shoulder and sort of got the state to come in once again and pile a bunch asphalt

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you, Mr. Dobrzyn.

MR. DOBRZYN: Thank you. Have a good evening.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MR. HETMAN: Good evening, Council.

Gerard Hetman from Lackawanna County's

Community Relations Department. Just to

follow up on Mr. Dobrzyn's comments, first

he had requested from me, and maybe there

was a little bit of misunderstanding there a

copy of the flyer that the commissioners had printed and distributed regarding recycling several years ago describing what was accepted or not accepted at the recycling center in municipal recycling pickup. I did e-mail an electronic copy of the flyer that I had in my records to him, if counsel would like to see that we can forward that to you as a sample. Of course, that has the old logo and the old information on it from the past administration, but we did keep those on file if you wanted to see that for reference we would be happy to supply that to you.

Second, regarding the recycling center and the electronics, the policy now is that the center does accept electronics, I believe there is a \$1 fee, and I believe we have discussed this before, a \$1 fee per pound for all of the electronic items brought to the recycling center, and I know that's a hardship and it's not the ideal solution, but under the current state laws this is a statewide issue and each recycling center and recycling entity has chosen

different ways to deal with the problem until a statewide fix is implemented at the state level and this is the one that authority has chosen to make it still accessible and affordable for all to access that, so the center does accept electronics, but there is just a \$1 fee.

Just one last thing, on the letter from Mr. Wallace, Mr. Wallace will look forward to meeting specifically with Mr. Bulzoni, we had also copies him on the letter to the mayor, but certainly we could ask if any members of council wanted to meet with him, we would be happy to do with that. He is willing certainly to discuss the issue of the Globe Store sale and he asks if that would impact the city and the school district with both the city and school district at your discretion.

So thank you, and that's all I have, gentlemen, have a great night.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

MS. SEITZINGER: Good evening,

Council. Kara Seitzinger, city resident and taxpayer. First off, I was here two weeks

ago, as you know, and I kind of went hard at you, I think, a little bit and I hope that you understand. I want to apologize. Ιf you took it the wrong way, the reason for my questions that I posed is because I simply am still so miffed at the entire situation. I'm so miffed at the fact that we have a Court settlement agreement that has been It's clear. I mean, in my violated. opinion it's clear, but again, I don't have my law degree, so that being said I really methodically went through the questions, I listed them, I posed them, and I put them to you all because I think that you do care. believe -- I elected four or five of you myself, I went to the polls and did that and I worked for some of you for your campaigns and so I know that there is this give and take, there has also been, you know, I don't like when people bash the administration, I don't like when people bash council members. I watched it for years and it has made me ill to the point where I couldn't even watch council meetings, and I don't think it's fair because it's a tough job to be in

political office, but when you run that's what you take on, and I think that our current mayor, you know, always sort of bashed our former mayor of not being present and apparently he is not present at least to You have reassured us that you can -us. you have his ear and for me I am going to trust you in that, so that's my mea culpa because I heard Mr. Evans, I turned the TV on for a minute last week, I couldn't get here because I did make a vow to be here until this was resolved, but my daughter had an asthma attack and I couldn't be here so I did hear him say that. I certainly don't mean to be disrespectful in any way because there is enough of disrespectful people that come into this forum and it's just not fair.

Secondly, I'm going to address the issue because Tom Welby came last week, a friend of Marty Flynn's contacted me as an intermediary saying that he was willing to come a Greenridge neighborhood meeting and speak and I, of course, with the Greenridge neighborhood president got the approval to invite Marty and tell him he can come at any

time, but our one stipulation was that Mr. Flynn had to attend not Mr. Welby or anybody else in Mr. Flynn's position.

Mr. Welby had texted me back the next morning that he thought he was in session, it's an open-ended meeting. We elected Mr. Flynn, we can unelect Mr. Flynn, and so I really feel, I agree that you have taken the lead but he is also our representative and many of us put him into office and to not take a stance on it or to say you weren't sure that that's what occurred, these are conversations or text messages that Mr. Flynn sent to a friend it's simply not fair. So if we can get some type of a forum I think that that is absolutely on par.

And now while we are on the subject of political officials, Vince Amico is a newly elected Dunmore councilmen. Vince Amico is the only councilman who ran on the platform against the leachate, KSL, and he won by an overriding margin. If you go to a Dunmore meeting, and I have not myself because I don't know that they welcome

Scranton residents nor did I necessarily have the time but I probably should make it, this has been addressed again and again and again, but I'm sure that you all know that many municipal facilities in the Borough of Dunmore have been built by the very members who benefit from Keystone Landfill, so that being said I think that it's very -- a little bit unfair to Mr. Amico to say that where is Dunmore. I think we know where Dunmore stands in this entire situation.

I had a couple of the questions,

Mr. Evans already answered them for me so

I'm just going to ask them really quickly.

The time limit, I know we have not placed a

time limit, is that something this we can

do?

MR. EVANS: Yes.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, I mean, we sent the letter to Mr. Shrive on Monday, I believe.

MR. SEITZINGER: Okay.

MR. WECHSLER: We had a request on Thursday, we sent it on Monday.

MS. SEITZINGER: Is somebody willing

to take on the task here on council of following up with Mr. Shrive on that?

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ WECHSLER: We have all taken that task, we all have.

MS. SEITZINGER: Okay.

MR. ROGAN: As far as the timeline goes, I think what might be fair is I don't know how long it takes to write a legal opinion, I don't think any of us do, but maybe we can consult with our attorney on how long that process takes and then come up with a good timeline, but it's been a few weeks already.

MS. SEITZINGER: I think another week is more fair.

MR. WECHSLER: And I'm not defending anyone, but Attorney Shrive is involved with the Sewer Authority deal, the Parking Authority deal, the discussion of the settlement, and we are all familiar with the workload that the city solicitor's office has and we are anxious to get this thing answered, but there are other things on his plate.

have another minute?

MR. WECHSLER: Go ahead.

MS. SEITZINGER: And I understand that having been in that office myself. I do understand that, but there are some real conflicts of interest going on and I just -- I honestly, this sale is going to go through and then we are going to have to answer to Pennsylvania American Water, it's going to wind up, as I said again, in litigation of some kind and it's not going to be good.

My other two questions were does the Scranton Sewer Authority Board discuss and/or approve permits during their meetings, if you know, and if you don't know can you pose that question? Is Gene Barrett aware of permit amendments to legal litigation and if so can you please pose that question.

The last two things I had were that we have the yellow ribbons available at the Greenridge Neighborhood Association, we meet every Tuesday -- or, I'm sorry, the second Tuesday of every month, our next meeting is next Tuesday at 7:00 625 Deacon Street in

Dunmore, and you are all welcome to come, pick up a ribbon, anyone in the City of Scranton.

And, finally, the Scranton Sewer

Authority will have a meeting tomorrow at
6:30 and I encourage every single Scranton
resident to attend that meeting.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A. MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Yeah, I wasn't going to speak, but I want to address what Ms.

Schumacher said. As far as funding for the pension goes, if we are going to fund the pensions we are going to need pension reform as well because at this point in time if we don't fix what got us to this point that money that we fund the pension with I feel is never going to be able to catch up with itself.

Now, as far as I like ideas, some things that I would like to see, some of the things that I would like to see as far as

pension reform goes, and this will all be, you know, negotiated the next CVA -- with the FOP, how about we increase the age of the collection. If we can extend the time a little bit when pensions are received that might take some weight off of us.

Obviously, the other idea is to increase the amount of pension percentage that is being put in by the FOP and by the Fire Department. That is something that will also offset it.

But something to think about as well when we are dealing with the pensions, the police officers from the FOP they do not get social security and lot of people don't realize that so when they retire their pension is the only thing they have to live on. I know I paying social security, most of us do, they do not and they are not allowed to collect social security when they retire, so we need to keep that in mind.

We also need to keep in mind that
the city solvency comes first and, you know,
I do believe that we need to fund the
pensions to right this ship in the city but

to keep that city ship afloat we need some kind of pension reform as well, and those two ideas are something that I would be for 100 percent, and that's all I have today, Mr. Wechsler.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, a couple of items. First, I would like to congratulate the students at West Scranton Intermediate School. They did have a ceremony today, I was planning on attending but I had a meeting I couldn't move around. This is actually the second year in a row that the students at West Scranton Intermediate School finished in the top 1 percent of a national contest with CSPAN. The students put together a project and they did it on immigration, and I was actually working for Congressman Barletta at the time and he was one of the individuals who they interviewed for the contest.

And a proclamation was presented to them today during the award ceremony, which we have a copy of here, and Scranton Council wishes to congratulate Fiona Evans and Abbey

O'Brien on their outstanding achievement and their parents John and Kathleen Evans and Mark and Linda O'Brien as well as their teacher Mr. Eric Mannheim.

This is two years in a row. Last year I was able to attend the ceremony they had at the intermediate school to view the presentation and is great to see a local one of our schools, one that I went to, compete on a national level and make it in the top 1 percent so big congratulations to them.

Recycling and garbage was brought up quite a bit this week through the media and also at our council meeting. As you know, I have been a long proponent of changing our current structure in the City of Scranton to either a per bag fee or privatization of the Department of Public Works. In the meantime, there is something that everyone can do to help to keep costs down and that is to recycle.

Many of the items, and this is actually the list that Mr. Hetman mentioned from the county that we have, many items that can now be recycled that just a few

years ago couldn't, for instance, in your red bin that goes out every other week, which must of us call the newspaper bin, it's not limited to just newspapers anymore. My newspaper bin, my paper bin, is always filled to the brim and I don't even buy the Scranton Times. Some of the items that can put in there, newspapers, magazines, catalogs, mail, envelopes, cereal boxes, cracker boxes, pizza boxes, that's the one this fills mine, paper towel rolls, construction paper, light weight boxes, cardboard boxes. Any type of cardboard you have you can put in these boxes, in these bins and put it out in what was traditionally the paper, the newspaper bin.

In the blue, the mixed bins, which is traditionally glass bottles, plastic bottles you could do glass bottles and jars, aluminum and steel cans, beverage and food containers, plastic bottles and tubs with the tops, milk, yogurt, soda, water, soup and margin containers. That's plastic as far as that goes.

Speciality items, leaves, brush,

grass, motor oil, tires, Styrofoam, compact fluorescent lamps, which are those little spiral bulbs which contain mercury in those and other household hazardous waste you can call 570-963-2017, extension one, for information regarding those speciality items.

Items that are not supposed to be thrown out in the recycling bin are food wrappers, foam dishes and cups, wraps, films, plastic bags, Ziplock bags, Saran Wrap types, snack bags, windows, broken glass windows are not recyclable. You can't put those in with your glass bottles. Plastic cups, Solo-style cups, eye glasses, I was surprised to see that one on the list, you can donate those to your local Lions Club. Toys, mugs, straws, and planted pot, potted plats, those items cannot be recycled.

So that's a run down of the list of items that can and can't be recycled. There are others I'm sure you can think of, but again, you are call the Office of Environmental Sustainability with any

questions or direct it to city council and we will find those answers.

But as I have mentioned, and I know Councilmen Evans has been mentioned repeatedly, there are a lot of people in the City of Scranton that aren't recycling. It's heartbreaking and it's very unfortunate. By not recycling not only you are you hurting the environment and adding more garbage to our landfill but you are costing yourself more money. We have to pay for every ton or garbage we dump and with recycling not only do we save on those costs for the tipping fees we are also receiving grants back, so I'd like to encourage everyone to recycle, and I'd really like to see the Scranton Times, as much as I bash the paper we do have a good reporter here, Jim Lockwood, and I would like to see the Times do some publication of this because many people don't know that you can do a lot more than just your newspaper and just your bottles and cans.

A couple of other items, the Sewer Authority deal has been brought up quite a

bit and specifically the proceeds. As I mentioned earlier, there hasn't been a determination on how the proceeds are going to be used and what percentages.

Personally, I would like to see a mix of -obviously, some funding does have to go into the pensions, but we also have a number of high interest debt obligations that need to be paid off, and I think a mix between those items and possibly some infrastructure improvements throughout the city would be a good balance on how to best use those proceeds. I particularly would like to see debt paid off that has attached millage so by paying off the debt residents can receive -- see a little bit of a savings in their tax bill as well. So I think it needs to be an all of the above approach, we can't put all of our eggs in one basket. We can't put all of the money into the pension fund, we can't use it all to pay off debts specifically, there needs to be a balance that's struck. And I'm looking forward, I know the administration is working on that analysis to see what the best way to move

forward is so that's something that I'm looking to forward to.

Finally, I received a memo today from Linda Aebli from the Office of Economic and Community Development, this is regarding the Community Development Block Grant Plan for 2017. That covers all the grants that many times we get speakers asking -lobbying for their organizations the week prior or sometimes the month prior. time to do that is actually now. Monday, June 6 is when the Community Development Block Grant Program, the HOME Investment Program and the Emergency Solutions Grants when applications will first be available. They are available both online at the City's website and boy contacting the OECD Office at 570-348-4216. The application period runs from June 6 to August 5 at 3 p.m. Applications won't be taking any later than August 5 at 3 p.m.

And I know every year we have number of groups that contact us past the deadline, they were upset that they didn't apply, and if groups aren't applying we can't allocate

funds to groups that don't apply, so all the little leagues, football leagues that are out there, community groups that are looking for this funding now is the time to start getting your paperwork together to contact the city to apply, and that is all I have. Thank you.

Well. apparently recycling is a hot topic tonight so while we are waiting for the city to take initiative to press for state grant where we will find out ultimately what the true cost of collection really is, I know we put into the budget this year a job for recycling coordinator, and I think we have recycling consultant as well so if we can I would like see some sort of report from both of those individuals to find out what is happening, what they are doing to increase the recycling in the interim in the city so if we can do that that would be a big help.

On a lighter note, Councilman

President Wechsler, Councilmen Gaughan, City

Clerk Lori Reed and myself competed again as a city council team in the annual contest "You Live Here, You Should Know This", the fundraiser benefiting the Lackawanna Historical Society. Again, we made the semi-finals with another great performance and we had a lot of fun. We did run into a bit of a buzz saw though in the semis and had to bow out right before the finals, but again, we had a great time.

On pension reform, as we all know I have been and advocate of pension reform since I have been on City Council. In working with my colleagues and others, I plan on putting together a comprehensive list of reforms that I want to see put in place prior to any infusion of money into the underfunded and underperforming pension plans, but one thing that can be done sooner, rather than later, is what I have been asking of the mayor for over 18 months, the administration should immediately begin the process of putting all nonunion personnel and the cabinet members, including the mayor, into a 401K-style plan.

Sometimes it's important to lead by example and this would definitely send a positive message to set the stage for further pension reforms prior to the sewer deal closing so I'm hoping the mayor finally pays attention to my requests. It's a simple fix. I think it's a sound business practice for him to do that, and again, show leadership by example and let's get this thing done. That's all I have for now.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Just to follow up on the comments that were made about pension reform, we have been pursuing this really since we became a group on city council, but one issue that seems to be forgotten all of the time is that actually we need reform in the state. Scranton is the only Class 2-A city in Pennsylvania and as such we are obligated to pay our pensions in direct defined benefits. At this time, we are not allowed to go to a 401-K-type of plan even if everyone agreed to it in negotiations we are not able to do that at this time in our contract so that is a some effort that we need from the reform from the

state as well.

Mr. Rogan had mentioned the celebration today of the West Scranton students, and I would like to thank
Mrs. Lori Reed who went and represented us today and she did a great job and I do appreciate her taking time our of her day to go over and represent us. She also was the smartest one on the team the other night.
We take advantage of whoever we can to help us.

MR. WECHSLER: What is the recommendation of the Chairperson for the Committee on Finance?

MR. EVANS: As Chairperson for the Committee on Finance, I recommend final passage of Item 7-B.

MR. ROGAN: Second.

MR. WECHSLER: On the question?

MR. ROGAN: On the question, I would just like to say this is an issue that has been ongoing since I first ran for council in 2007, which was the labor battle between the previous mayor and our public safety unions. Unfortunately, the results to the taxpayers is more debt that we have, unfortunately, have no choice to approve it.

It is my hope that this debt and this issue serves as a reminder to all of us in future labor negotiations on what can be do and what can't be done.

Unfortunately, the dice were rolled in the past and obviously the city lost and this debt, unfortunately, is a big part of former Chris Doherty's legacy and today we work on cleaning that up. I would like to commend the mayor and particularly Business Administrator Dave Bulzoni for being able to obtain financing. For many years the city wasn't even in a position to borrow money to pay this debt and we are paying interest at the rate of over \$100,000 per month. Fortunately, we would still be paying interest now at a lesser rate and with some of the interest that was earned going into pension fund so this is something I'm glad is finally going to be off the backs of elected officials and of the taxpayers, unfortunately, the paying for this debt is going to last a long time and it's all because of a deciding to fight instead of sitting down and negotiating in good faith.

As a cautionary note, if this interest rate comes in higher than we anticipate, we also have to have the courage to walk away from that deal so I'm very hopeful that it's going to be get done and it's going to get done properly and done with, again, an interest rate we can live with, but we have to have the courage to walk away if that is not the That's all I have. case.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, and to echo
Mr. Evans' comment, we did have a work
session with the administration and Business
Administrator Bulzoni made that statement
that he understands that there is a break
even point for this deal, and if we don't
meet that threshold from my understanding in
talking to him we won't proceed with it so I
think they understand that going in.

Today the Redevelopment Authority voted on their portion of this process and they did respond to our request, they did

lessen their fees for their role that they are going to play in the respective negotiations, I believe it's going to be -- their fees are going to be around \$40,000, which is significantly lower than normal so we are happy that they understood the importance of this situation and acted responsibly.

MR. PERRY: Yeah, on the question, this has been going on a long time in the city and while us, the taxpayers, it's not over for us yet because we will have to pay this, the fighting is over, and the decision has been made and due to the work, as Mr. Rogan said, of the administration and Mr. Bulzoni they did somehow get some financing for this which we were in search for a very long time, and to echo what Mr. Evans said, and it does need to be reasonable because we were paying \$100,000 a month in interest and on top and on top without an end in sight, and I have all of confidence in the world that when we get our interest rate that it will be much kinder, much kinder than \$100,000 a month and will

1	also give us an end of the road, whereas,
2	before that there was no end of the road and
3	it just kept getting larger. Once we pass
4	this today, we allocate that financing and
5	make our first anticipated payment this
6	November that road becomes shorter every day
7	instead of longer. That's all I have.
