1 (Pledge of Allegiance recited and moment of reflection observed.) 2 3 MR. WECHSLER: Roll call, please. 4 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Perry. MR. PERRY: Here. 5 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Rogan. 6 7 MR. 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citizens feel the same I d. This business of not having access to the lease agreement because it hasn't been completed yet, yet we scheduled a meeting, a public hearing for June 23, I don't understand. It's a little bit like putting the cart in front of the horse. At what point is that document going to be available for the public to review because what's point of the public attending the meeting if we can't ask logical coherent questions we have no time to review that document, I don't understand. It's almost like the way we do the city budget every year, you know, having to beg for the drafts so that we can comment on it. Does anybody have a feel for what that lease agreement is going to be completed and available for review?

don't know if that's has been discussed yet 1 in the city. I know in other cities it has. 2 3 MS. STRATZ: I have a neighbor --MR. MINORA: If I may explain --4 5 MR. GAUGHAN: Oh, sure. MS. STRATZ: -- who is flying a drone 6 7 over my house. 8 MR. GAUGHAN: Our solicitor is going 9 to -- no, that's okay. 10 MR. MINORA: The FFA has regulations 11 on the use of drones so we are -- we the 12 state and cities are preempted from 13 legislating on that area. There are 14 regulations. You would have look on the FFA website, I don't know what they are but I 15 16 know they are. 17 MS. STRATZ: Okay, but what about 18 for -- I know that they can like be in 19 commercial areas, but what about residential 20 areas because I have a neighbor who is 21 flying his drone over my house. 22 MR. MINORA: All drones are 23 regulated by the FFA. 24 MS. STRATZ: Okay, so I should 25 contact them to get the regulations?

MR. MINORA: It's Federal Aviation 1 Administration. 2 3 MS. STRATZ: Right. Well, I happen to have that number, I looked, but I wanted 4 5 to know if there was anything specific on the books. 6 7 MR. MINORA: I'm saying we are 8 unable to do that. We are preempted by 9 federal legislation in that area. 10 MR. ROGAN: Your best bet might be 11 to contact Congressman Courtright's Office. 12 They might be able to open an inquiry for 13 you and some of those regulations. 14 MS. STRATZ: Okay, thank you. MR. GAUGHAN: 15 Thank you. 16 MR. WECHSLER: Ron Ellman. 17 MR. ELLMAN: Hello, Council. 18 Tuesday night I was at Luigi's up in 19 Mountain Top and this young lady my age came 20 over to me and asked how come I never really 21 partake in the conversations that are 22 current to the city. One reason is I don't 23 have a computer, and secondly is all of the 24 obstentiated (phonetic.) Nonsense that's in 25 the paper that I don't have much faith in.

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I think I could pass it onto that there is just so many informed talented people come before this council for their few minutes and I'm not one of them. I think people they had to know their capabilities. her answer I guess, but I think in the 15 years or so that I have been down here, been longer than that, that I have accomplished -- made a couple of accomplishments, but I remember a year half ago when I stood here and got ridiculed about putting a mall -- a marketplace in the mall, I know the mall wasn't ours, but we needed some influence and I'm so happy so now that you people took over that idea and did something with it because I think that marketplace if it's informal like Allentown and Pottstown where I go will be very, very successful.

And, secondly, I want to thank someone. I took Slugo, the Bassett hound for a walk to the river Monday morning, when I come back they had paved the street, north Main, and I don't -- this is boiling hot, I didn't even know that. The man jumped off

the steamroller, he said, "Don't put that dog -- don't cross that street," he said, "pick him up."

I said, "You don't pick up the Slugo."

It's just like picking up a 100 pounds of jelly or something, you know, so this gentlemen took the steamroller and went and back and squirted water on the street for me and another gentleman stopped traffic because Slugo's little legs are like that and it takes him awhile to walk. This foreman should be proud to have two conscientious people like this working for him. It was such a nice, unnecessary kindness.

And I know the American Water is putting in new pipes in West Side, what's going to happen to these new streets?

MR. GAUGHAN: They did tell us that they were coordinating with the utility company.

MR. ELLMAN: They are?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes.

MR. ELLMAN: I didn't know that.

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That just dawned on me money that they're putting -- because my plumber phoned me and he told me he wants to come over and put an inexpensive pressure valve in my house because the new pipes have more pressure than being brand new, and he said they are blowing the safety valves on water heaters and, you know, the heaters for the winter heaters, and I think everybody needs every penny they could scrape together for our new taxes every year, that's why I just mentioned that, but he told me it's just an expensive valve you put outside of the water and it doesn't -- water where it comes into the house, and again, I want to thank those two men for helping me with the dog, and the paving looks beautiful. They have done the sewers by my house and even in the street for some reason, but, you know, the other part of Main Street, Jackson and Main there must be is a four-inch drop on the sewer, it's terrible. It's like this (indicting) and somebody needs to address it. you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Is there anyone else who would like to address council?

MR. SBARAGLIA: Andy Sbaraglia, citizen of Scranton, fellow Scrantonian.

I'm, too, had a lot of questions about the Electric City garage. Are we referring to the annex only or the old Globe Store garage that's attached to this?

 $$\operatorname{MR}.$$ EVANS: The old -- I think it's the old Globe store.

MR. WECHSLER: The whole Electric City garage.

MR. EVANS: It's all connected now.

MR. SBARAGLIA: Then obviously the front part is not ready to fall apart, we know that, and we also know that the theatre is grandfathered in for so many free parking spaces above that section of the garage, so whatever they said about him doing this and that, it's hogwash. He is already grandfathered in so many free parking spaces in the annex part of the Electric City garage, and the only thing I can see is the county buying the Globe Store, all of a sudden that section of the garage becomes a

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gold mine. To anyone with brains we know that. They plan to lease it to the -- well, they are going to charge the people who work for the county. That's why the county should have been offering to buy that garage, that section of the garage anyway instead of this quick deal, and to many laws requires the same as 1-A law. I mean, our 2A city is the same as Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. All properties that they consider we'll put it consider that they can get rid of is supposed to be put out on bid. Now, how they figured they are going to get this quick deal with this garage is beyond No thing on it, I didn't even see the me. price they were going to give.

You know and I know too much deal making is being done with this project and not necessarily to the goodness of the people of Scranton. If we wanted to sell the garage we should offered it to the county or to any other individual that wishes to buy that garage because now it becomes a gold mine. Unless you are willing to condemn that garage, which I don't think

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Now, we said you would have to be That means it would have to have torn down. been condemned. Did the city engineer condemn it? Are people still using that garage? Whatever you do, don't sit there and stonewall the people. That gives the impression that you are not very honest and that's not right. I'm sure you are all honorable people and want to do best for the city so I assume you would want the best price for that garage if it has to be sold, but don't give us hogwash saying that it has to be torn down because the annex was built the same time as the mall and you are not tearing the mall down so chances are you are not going to tear down the annex, and the annex is where the free parking for the theatre is. If you read when they built it, you will find out it's grandfathered in, so many free spots in that annex for the theatre.

I ain't going to give you too much because I'm waiting to get more data on it, but I can see what's going on and it's not very good. Like they say, if anything

smells like cheese it usually stinks like cheese and this deal does do that, it falls into that category. I'm sorry to hear it. I'm sorry to see that they would even think of doing something like that, but to try and say the garage has to be torn down and it's not condemned or the annex doesn't have free parking for the theatre that's hogwash. Thank you.

As we will not be permitted to ask questions at the caucus on the parking asset sale will you, our elected officials and representatives, agree to provide us with the questions you intend to ask by the close of business Tuesday the 14th of June so that we, your constituents, may provide additional questions for which we would like answers? MR. WECHSLER: I would rather have you provide us questions because --

MR. EVANS: We'll fill the gaps in.

MS. SCHUMACHER: You are the elected officials, you do what --

SCHUMACHER: Before I get back to the urgent need for reassessment and showing many of the City of Scranton property owners are being overcharged to the benefit of the balance of the county property owners, I ask that you consider adding some metrics. Two possible candidates. First, in April you passed File of Council No. 21 defining and authorizing tax exemptions from real property tax in order to improve deteriorating real property in certain areas of the City of Scranton. Would you please begin reporting monthly how many qualified permits have been pulled?

MR. EVANS: Sure. That is back on the agenda tonight, by the way, because -- I'll explain that later.

MS. SCHUMACHER: Fine. Second, each month the tax collector reports on year-to-date collections comparing the

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current year with the prior year and percent of change. The last one I saw for the last month shows we are lagging, we are not even meeting the tax increase, so since Mayor Courtright did not follow through on his commitment to provide electronic access to the backup for each agenda item, not has his council taken any initiatives in that regard, a trip must be made to city hall to the council's office during business hours to obtain the data the tax collector provides, so may I suggest you begin a monthly report on how the year-to-date status for each property compares with that of the cash flow document. I think that would be very beneficial.

And that brings up the yet another issue, on January 28 you authorized a contract with Muni Services to provide online financial data presentment services. When will we see a product online? What financials are they going to report online and when will see the product? You get an answer for that for next week?

MR. EVANS: I'll try.

MS. SCHUMACHER: My statements that I have on the -- may I finish on the reassessment need? You asked what the average, and we all, again, setting the stage, the common level ratio reflects the level of assessments at a particular time or given year and it's further defined in the Pennsylvania Law, "Common level ratio shall mean the ratio of assessed value to current market value used generally in the county as last determined by the State Tax Equalization Board."

Now, since July of last year we should be getting a new one soon it's, six pit and like three three, and I reported last week how -- you know what I reported last week, but you asked what was the average. Well, sadly, the average for the city was 7.6, and for the rest of the county it was 11.6. 53 percent higher than the city. That's screams for help and --

MR. EVANS: It does.

MS. SCHUMACHER: And the property sine I stopped doing the daily logging of each property, 59 of the 135 properties that

1 have been sold since I believe starting the 19th of March, 44 percent of the sales in 2 3 Scranton are below the common level ratio, 44. 4 5 MR. WECHSLER: Thank you very much. 6 Thank you. 7 MS. SCHUMACHER: One more. 8 MR. WECHSLER: You are past your six minutes, so please --9 10 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay, I'll hold it 11 for next week. Thank you. MR. WECHSLER: You'll have to 12 13 squeeze it in. Anyone else? 14 MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council. Dave Dobrzyn, resident and taxes paid. Fees 15 16 This effects Scranton, it reads, paid. 17 "Pennsylvania has been hit hard by plant 18 closures and job losses," it's on NAFTA, and 19 right here, and I'll show it to the 20 audience, it's right about where Scranton, 21 Pennsylvania. Currently, we have about 35 people on the floor at Chamberlain or 22 23 General Dynamics, it's listed as General 24 Dynamics here, and why is it a NAFTA job 25 loss? Because NAFTA is lopsided, and that's

what I have been talking about for a year now. With small towns like us or small cities. Here we have a major employer and the tanks shells are probably being imported from Mexico. We are paying taxes to the federal government and money goes to Mexico and the jobs go to Mexico and here we are. Military industrial complex, Globalman. Maybe we can beg them if we are involved in an altercation for some free material. Now, contact your Congressman and tell them scrap their outsourcing of jobs and trade packs, please.

On this Parking Authority deal, it's peculiar, I agree with somewhat of what Andy said, but I seen in there where someone is buying it and releasing it back to the organization that's taking it over and I wonder who is on the books for the repairs for that other garage and that's my question. Are we going to have the money funneled off from the rest of garages to fix that one while somebody else owns it and that's I don't know. That's a good pretty contorted situation there, so certainly it's

I could

Mr. Dobrzyn, I do have

bad enough we are dumping the gold mine but 1 2 then on top of it we are fixing that gold 3 mine up after it's in somebody else's hands. And the treasury deal, what is the 4 5 deal with that deputy tax collector? MR. EVANS: I don't know, your guess 6 7 is as good as mine. I don't know what the deal is. I'm trying to figure that out. 8 9 MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah, it's peculiar. MR. EVANS: It's if the case the tax 10 11 collector becomes incapacitated. 12 MR. DOBRZYN: What? 13 MR. EVANS: If the tax collector 14 becomes incapacitated this is the person that is in line to take his position so 15 16 there is I guess there is continuity there, 17 but I think it's kind of weird to be honest 18 with you. 19 MR. DOBRZYN: Yeah, yeah. 20 see that I guess. We did have a tax 21 collector that was incapacitated most of the 22 time a few years back. 23 MR. EVANS: Why it's being done now, 24 I'm not sure.

MR. GAUGHAN:

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something here it says that it is a formality, Section 22 of the Local Tax Collection Law, allows for an appointment of a deputy with the approval of a municipality for which the tax collector was elected. The deputy's role would be to collect and settle taxes in the event of the incapacitation of the tax collector. The deputy must be qualified, certified, completed the education requirements and criminal background check. This gentleman we will be voting on tonight is the current tax collector of Old Forge. He will not work in the Single Tax Office, he is not paid, this is not a paid position, he wouldn't collect any salary, so it's just a formality.

MR. EVANS: Sort of like being the runner up to Ms. America.

MR. DOBRZYN: Well, we do in case somebody becomes incapacitated. I'm not making fun of you guys, but I just had a question on that. The Nay Aug Park Authority I found out for myself is every Monday, the first Monday of the month at

7:00 p.m. and I will be up there because I have some concerns. I don't want to keep beating up on you guys about the cigarette issue when it's, like I said, stop smoking and you're helping your health fix potentially, but, you know, there is nothing worse than having a concession stand where people aren't attending. Thank you and have a good night.

MR. WECHSLER: Anyone else?

MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

MOTIONS.

MR. WECHSLER: Mr. Perry?

MR. PERRY: Yes, I have a couple of things. Just to brush up from last week there was a couple of questions, one was about the Sandone Tire Company if they are going to give us any kind of monetary relief or a donation to offset some of the costs that we have and replace some equipment for the fire department. I'm still working on that so I don't have any hard answers for you on that one.

The second one was the bike law, and I was able to pull off some information.

This is a Pennsylvania law as it refers to bicycles. Every person riding a bicycle upon the streets, alleys or public places shall be subject to the provisions of all statutes of the Commonwealth and ordinances of the city applicable to the operations of any vehicle.

In other words, they are allowed on the streets. They have to abide by stop signs, streetlights, anything a car or motorcycle has to follow so that's bicyclists. Sidewalks are absolutely prohibited for bicyclists, and bicycles shall operate as close to the right-hand curb as conditions will be permitted and they are allowed to ride in tandem, two at a time to the far most right side.

The driver's responsibility when it comes to bicycles in the city, operators of a motor vehicle have the responsibility of passing bicyclists with a four-foot distance between them and the bike. So if there is an instance where you do want to pass the bicyclist, you need to give them a four-foot curb on when they can pass.

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Third thing, which I believe was already answered before was the police and fire court award and that is a scheduled for closing on June 29, but that's everything I have today.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. Rogan?

MR. ROGAN: Yes, just two items tonight. First regarding the parking situation on Sanderson Avenue, I am going to make a point to come out and visit you next week on lunch time so you get a little bit of business as well from me but, you know, I'm glad to see that this is tabled and there has to be some sort of arrangement that can be made here. I understand that there was an error made a long time ago, but when businesses have been operating under a certain set of rules for as long as you have and it has been very successful in the City of Scranton we need to do everything we can to accommodate the businesses in the city. There is already enough obstacles to do business in Scranton, we don't want to create any further ones.

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Next, it was nice hearing a good compliment for our Office of Economic and Community Development and I have another good piece of good news in that vein as well for tonight. About a year ago, I believe about a year ago, myself and Councilman Evans, Jessie Ergott from Neighbor Works of Northeast PA met with Wayne's office regarding first time homebuyers and how to stimulate that market, and I'd like to thank Mr. Bulzoni and the mayor for getting legislation to us that really was --Councilman Evans took the lead and then we met again with Jessie and his group and got that together, so I do want to talk a little bit about that, and this is right from the legislation.

It says, "Whereas, through a partnership between Scranton City Council and Neighborhood Works of Northeastern Pennsylvania, the Scranton Home Assistance Program will provide incentive programming for home buyers to purchase single family homes within the City of Scranton; and, whereas, the goal of Scranton Home

Assistance program is to bring properties back on the tax role by way of offering cash assistant to homebuyers purchasing homes in the Scranton area. Through the assistance of Neighbor Works and Scranton City Council, homebuyers will be offered a \$5,000 grant towards purchasing a single family home with the city limit. The grant award will be utilized to provide homebuyers with exterior improvements to their new homes that may have otherwise been postponed or neglected as well as improvements that may increase the property value.

Some of the parameters of this program are a little bit different than through the Office of Economic Development first time homebuyer's program. These are the eligibility criteria. The home must be the primary residence for the buyer. The home, of course, must be in the City of Scranton limits. The purchase of the home, the home price must not exceed \$120,000. \$5,000 must be utilized for exterior home improvements and/or repairs made to the property. It must be meet the requirement

of the lender and mortgage insurer, the property must be a single family one-unit residence including approved condominiums.

And, finally, manufactured housing is allowed when combined with an FHA first mortgage home loan and the home must be on a permanent foundation. If exterior repairs are not needed, the homebuyer may utilize \$5,000 towards interior health and safety repairs such as HVAC upgrades, security, fire alarms, and insulation where needed.

Additionally, access to free additional light improvements will be offered to the recipients of these grants through Neighbor Works. They have a great skilled volunteer program. One of them that is pretty well know is Paint the Town that does go through specific neighborhoods and try to spruce up the homes of many times older citizens who can't either afford or can't physically do that work themselves.

And, finally, free counseling will be available for first time homebuyers through this program as well. So this is a great program that I think will help

Scranton, and in particular first time homebuyers, and not only will it make it easier for people to buy homes but those exterior improvements will hopefully increase the value of all homes in those neighborhoods, so I am very glad to see that after probably a year this legislation is finally coming up for a vote, but this is legislation will be a big help for the city and it's something that I hope that we can expand upon if this pilot program is successful and it can be funded much more through our OECD applications. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you.

Mr. Evans?

MR. EVANS: Thank you. I'd like to expand on that a little bit and thank
Councilman Rogan for all of his hard work involved as well. To give a little history lesson, it goes back to when we passed a foreclosure registration ordinance that Councilman Rogan brought the company in to talk about with us and what that does is register all of the foreclosed properties

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within the City of Scranton, it creates a database for the city. We know who the owners are and who the contact personnel are with all of the foreclosures, the problem with the property, high grass, weeds, broken windows, etcetera, the city knows who to contact immediately and our thought process was the city is going to gain about 30, 35 thousand dollars in revenue from that, so why put that money in the black hole once We decided to go out and try to find again. a program that would help citizens and help home owners and foster homeownership as well as improve the neighborhoods by giving grants hopefully mostly for exterior improvements and we have evaluated the -there is no income guidelines so a lot of people that were excluded from other programs can be included in this programs so it's a two-fold approach, a perfect private/public partnership in both cases, and so I want to thank Councilman Rogan again for bringing the initiative, the first part of it, and working together with me to the second part of it and all of the

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councilmen for being supportive of both initiatives in the very beginning.

We talked about the reassessment again, one of my favorite subjects. To give a little background on the common level ratio, the CLR, which Marie stated was 6.33, what we are referring to is the state comes in and does a study on the market value based on the sales this year and that's where the number comes from. So what Marie -- it's very interesting what she is doing, what she is basically finding out is that you take the assessed value of your property and you multiply that by the common level ratio that should be what your market value For example, if you have a \$20,000 assessment and you multiply it by 6.33, your property should be worth \$126,000 --\$126,600 and what we were finding is a large majority of the sales are below what should be considered the market value and that's a dangerous situation to have.

So by every standard conceivable we need a reassessment. There is no question about it. It would be a positive for

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economic development, it would bring about tax fairness for the first time in over 45 years to our citizens and I think the point is that Scranton is getting the brunt of the impact of not having a reassessment more than other areas because their market values are going up and their assessments are staying the same.

Another issue, the leachate line, we asked for Attorney Shrive to give us a report by June 15, you sent that letter; right?

MS. REED: Yes.

MR. EVANS: Prior to next council meeting we expect to have his opinion back to us, that's our request. We did put a hard date on it so hopefully that will happen next week, and everything else I will wait to discuss during agenda items. you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you. Mr. Gaughan.

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, thank you, just a few items. First, we received a couple of complaints about properties on Hampton

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Street that had overgrown grass so we sent that along to Licensing and Inspections

Department and hopefully that's taken care of. We also received a stop sign request at the corner of Prospect and Fig Street that we will send along to the city engineer.

I'd also like if we could contact the administration and ask that they update the city zoning board website to include recent and future agendas. The last agenda posted is from 2014.

I'd also ask this week that we send a letter out asking why the Recreation Authority is paying to have a city police officer patrol Nay Aug Park for three hours daily for the duration of the season at a cost of \$35 and the total cost comes to \$5,880 for the entire season. I'd like to know why we are doing this and why the Recreation Authority has to pay for this. Shouldn't this be a regular duty of whoever is in charge of that area, and as far as I know this was never done in the past, so I am asking for additional clarification on that.

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I also recently learned that the Governor's northeast regional office has moved from the Oppenheim building in downtown Scranton to Pittston. This to me is both infuriating and baffling. Scranton is the county seat and is largest city in Northeastern Pennsylvania. Did Mayor Courtright or anyone from this city fight to keep them here? This leads me back to my question that I have asked numerous times, who is fighting for the City of Scranton. I'd like to send a letter to find out if any effort was made on the part of the Mayor Courtright and his administration to keep the Governor's office in downtown Scranton, and I'd also like a letter to go to the Governor's office why the regional office was taken out of Scranton sent down to Pittston. To me, this is embarrassing.

Since I have been on city council, I have been trying to work with Mayor Courtright and his administration on improving the communication between city hall and the citizens of Scranton. One of the things that is being discussed, which I

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fully endorse, is a communications platform, a mobile allocation called C-Click Fix where citizens can report non-emergency issues like potholes, faded stop signs and other things and governments will track, manage and reply making the community better through transparency, collaboration and cooperation. This would be a brand new way for citizens to report quality of life concerns quickly and easily from smart phone applications as well as from the city website. The concerns will be submitted directly to the city department where they would be routed and assigned to the appropriate area based on the location and type of problem.

I felt since I have been on city council that many of the city's problems are related to communication. People feel that they call city hall and are sent 100 different directions and either never get an answer or can't get in touch with the proper person who can handle their problem. I'm hopeful that in the near future, we can streamline some of these problems and become

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more efficient at taking care of the issues that our citizens have on a daily basis.

And that is all I have this week. Thank you.

MR. WECHSLER: Thank you,

Mr. Gaughan. Just to summarize some of the comments that were made by my colleagues, I think it's very encouraging that the administration and council continues to provide assistance to stimulate and encourage investment in the city. Tonight on our agenda alone I believe there are three different items that encourage that development in the city and we are aggressively trying to get people buying homes in the city and taking the properties off the abandoned list, and hopefully these efforts will start to pay dividends, and if they don't it's not for lack of trying. have made considerable efforts. Mr. Rogan and Mr. Evans worked on the homebuyers program, Mr. Gaughan works on the land bank and we have all been supportive of the tax abatement and other programs that we have been encouraged, actually getting the county

and the school board on board with that so we are making aggressive efforts to combine our government efforts to focus on Scranton and hopefully see some dividends from these programs.

And on a lighter note, on Sunday

Councilman Evans and I learned how to

barbecue 100 chickens at a time, which was

quite interesting, and even though we passed

the no smoking ordinance, Connor's Park was

filled with smoke from the chicken fire, so

we have learned a valuable skill. If it

doesn't work out on city council, we can

always go out and barbecue chickens. That's

all I have.

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MR. WECHSLER: At this time, I'll entertain a motion that Item 5-B be introduced into its proper committee.

MR. ROGAN: So moved.

MR. EVANS: Second.

MR. WECHSLER: On the question?

MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question.

First of all, I'd like to thank George Kelly from the County's Economic Development Office for coming in and talking to us and explaining this intergovernmental cooperation agreement tonight. He is a great asset to our community. I'm extremely pleased to finally be voting on this agreement between the Lackawanna County land bank, the City and the Scranton School District. The concept of the land bank is to acquire and purchase vacant and underutilized property with a future goal of productive reuse of the land. As we all are aware in the City of Scranton vacant, abandoned and tax delinquent properties impose significant costs on neighborhoods by lowering property values, decreasing tax revenues, and undermining community

cohesion. Many of these vacant overgrown lots dot our neighborhoods and become major eyesores that frustrate our neighbors. Land banks allow local governments to overcome barriers that inhibit redevelopment of these problem properties. It makes it easier for developers, nonprofits, and individuals to acquire vacant publically owned land.

For example, the disposition of tax delinquent properties can be challenging when delinquent taxes exceed the property's market value or when there is no clear title to the property. The affordable housing stopped benefits from land banks. In the event that vacant lots cannot be developed due to lots irregular shape or small size, land banks can assemble adjoining parcels to create a larger, more marketable property. This would be particularly helpful for many properties in our city.

Across the country, land banks have become an effective tool to address these challenges, reversing the cycle of decline and decay, facilitating the transfer of vacant property, and most importantly

promoting economic development and neighborhood stabilization.

So I fully endorse this agreement between the county and the city and the school district and I look forward to working with all of the officials to make sure that we can improve our neighborhood and increase economic development and take care of these problem properties in our neighborhoods. Thank you.

MR. EVANS: On the question, I have to say that I don't think anyone is happier than myself and Councilman Gaughan for seeing this on the agenda tonight, but we continue to beat the drum to get this issue in the forefront, and I hope in some small way all of us here helped move this forward, and again, I'd like to thank George Kelly for coming tonight and giving us an update on where the land bank is, and you have our full support as you move forward with this very, very valuable tool. Thank you very much.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes. I was impressed with Mr. Kelly's presentation tonight. He

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has a good plan on how to begin this process. He has a good handle on where potential funding will be coming from that will minimize the cost and eliminate the cost to taxpayers in the city, so I'm very encouraged by having Mr. Kelly in charge of this plan and I really anticipate it to be successful.

MR. ROGAN: I would agree with all of the comments that my colleagues made and as Councilman Wechsler mentioned the majority of the items on or agenda tonight are all geared towards economic development of the city and towards stabilizing our housing stock in the city. So there is not going to be a cure all to fix some of the problems the city has had over many decades, but a combination of these different initiatives that the city council and the administration and the county have been pursuing will hopefully come together to really promote economic development within the city and to, first, stop people from leaving the city; and secondly, bring many people back into Scranton who have left or

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are looking to relocate here, so I'm very optimistic regarding all of these items that we are voting on tonight.

MR. PERRY: Yes. I also want to

thank Mr. Kelly. Basically what this is going to boil down to in the ordinance is streamline. What this land bank is going to do for us it's going to take our blight and it's going to take a streamline approach to get that on the tax rolls as soon as possible. That's about as simple as I can put it and, you know, we are all on board for this, and like we talked about. is many initiatives that we have out there trying to, you know, increase that by, as Mr. Evans said, and grow our way out of our issues that we are having here in Scranton, and as Mr. Wechsler said, you know, whether these bleed down quickly have a great effect on our city or run flat, it's not for lack of the trying by this council. Day in and day out we talk about economic development and growth all the time and that's a forefront and I know that's been our credo from the beginning.

1 So, again, thank you again for your presentation, it was very helpful, and I 2 3 have high expectations of this. Thank you. MR. These two properties are the last two that need to be acquired as part of the FEMA Army Corp project and will complete the hazard mitigation plan. Passage of this legislation will allow the city to acquire these two properties, settle with the current owners and demolish them and then they will remain as open space.

MR. WECHSLER: Yes, on the question, we tend to forget that the flood project is still going on in the city. There has been a lot of areas that have already been completed and we still have a small piece that's not done yet, a very important piece that's not done yet and a lot of the people that worked on this to get it to this point are either no longer involved in government or have moved on, and I think we have to take a look back and thank those people for their commitment that they showed to this project so many years ago. It was another

project that we were told was never going to happen, we were never going to get flood relief in the city, and through the hard work and combination from neighborhood groups, neighborhood groups through the City of Scranton and through our state reps and state senators, congressmen, senate, it with through the whole gamut to get this completed and the current levy project has saved the city several times already in just the past 15 years or so that it's been up so it's been a huge success. It's saved neighborhoods in the city and when this is completed it will truly be -- you are never 100 percent safe because it's the river and you could be on the side of the floods, but this does make us feel much safer.

I would just like to first thank Councilmen Evans and Rogan for their efforts on this program. I believe that this is going to be a great benefit to families who are investing in the city and I think we all recognize that it's time that we invest in those families and I think that this program accomplishes that. MR. ROGAN: I know I spoke on this at length, but I really have to thank Jessie Ergott and Neighbor Works. They have been a

great partner to the city not only with this program, but with the paint the town and the many other programs they are doing and I know they were brought up during our presentation with the county, working with the county hand-in-hand as well, so we really have to thank them for everything they have been doing for the city and the county.
