you. The only other thing I wanted to mention
on public comment is two things. So Miss
Franus had sent some comments in. Mrs. Reed,
can you just double-check with the
administration tomorrow whether or not they can
get back to us with answers to Mrs. Franus's
questions about the garbage -- the garbage
fees?

MS. REED: Yes.

MR. GAUGHAN: And the -- one of the other citizens that had addressed Council was Eileen Dorsey. She had asked several questions. I could answer some of them I think right off the bat. They're calling for City budget data to be made readily available and accessible to the public on a quarterly basis.

The City budget is posted on the City's website www.scrantonpa.gov. One of the things that Council has been calling for in the past was for data to be posted in terms of the budget on a quarterly basis. So I would agree with that statement and a call for that.

Unfortunately, we're not at that point yet. There was a push I think about two or three years ago for the City to use a platform called open Gov -- open dot gov, something to that effect. For whatever reason that kind of fell through the cracks.

I have talked to the Mayor in the last few months and I know one of the goals of her administration and I think one of the goals of this Council would be to get that data up for public review. So it's not up there now. But I'm hopeful that, you know, within the next few months to the next year that that would be an initiative that would be able to take place.

Her second question talks about the institution of community lead public safety teams as well as citizens review boards for the Scranton Police Department, when will this happen? That will be a decision that will be made by Mayor Cognetti and Chief Graziano.

And on our agenda tonight I believe Chief Graziano did address the citizens review boards in his comments. And I've sent quite a few emails out to people with similar questions and he has addressed that.

She also calls for police officers to be removed from schools and wants to know when that will happen. I'm not in favor of that at all. I think that would be a huge mistake. So I don't think anyone would want to entertain that at this point. And how will the City of Scranton expand police oversight measures and keep those measures in place? Again, I refer to Chief Graziano's letter that's on the agenda.

And lastly, Marie Schumacher had submitted several questions. She stated that she wanted information in Third Order this week in terms of the small business loan program. I did state last week that we were going to put that in Third Order. But after talking with Mrs. Reed and looking at it, that's not something we would generally put in Third Order because it's already on the City's website. We sent it to Mrs. Schumacher. And that's really more for the small businesses.

If anybody's interested in taking a look at that, it's already posted on the City's website. There's several other questions that, of course, we'll forward to the administration.

One of the questions why was the 2020 real estate tax levy only on land and not improvements? I thought I answered this last week or the week before. I'll just reiterate that the reasoning provided by the previous business administrator and PEL was that putting it on land and not improvements would be less punitive on the taxpayer.

And, Mrs. Reed, if you could also follow up with the administration just in terms of previous questions that Miss Schumacher has asked that have not been answered yet.

MS. REED: I will. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Anyone else on the question? All those in favor of -- all those in favor signify by saying aye.

MR. SCHUSTER: Aye.

Last week, Mr. Gaughan states several of my questions about the Agena items would be answered by the program guidance that the mayo provided; we'll put that in Third Order next week and it will be I'm sure on the webite and the public will be able to view that. That should take care of most of the questions here.

Yesterday morning I received am
e-mail from Mrs. Reed what I believe Mr. Gaughn

described as Guidance the Mayor provided. Oh, and when I reviewed the Agenda for tonight's Meeting I could not find the Mayor's response in Third Order.

I use response because out of seven items in my Fourth Order submission for the 26 May 2020 Meeting:

O Two were designated as "City Council Questions" so I hope one of the five Council Members will provide the answers this evening.

0 One was acceptably answered.

Twelve LERTA applications have been received since th 10-Year City-Wide Program was approved in February 2019.

O One was an out-an-out ignoring an answer to the question and an excuse for not being able to provide the data required to fulfill recommendation. Allow me to explain:

- my ignored question was what percent of the Trash bills have been payed to date? To me this was/is a no-brainer as if the Bill was not paid in full there would undoubtedly be a follow up; if the Bill was paid in full the payment would be \$270 as the

discount period extends to 15 July. In any case, the system must have a tally of the payments and I'm sure they know the number of Bills that were mailed so the percent should have been easy. Heck if they provided the raw numbers I would have calculated the percent myself.

- the recommendation was that

Council provide the percent on a weekly basis.

The excuse I received is, "The CIty does not currently have the technology or system to provide that information on a weekly basis."

This forces me to wonder just how archaic is our accounting system?

The number of Bill mailed stays the same and I can't believe the number of payments aren't recorded on a daily basis. So a new request is for a copy of the Process for accounting for the Trash revenue account. o Another question (When will those of us "saving" our cominged (blue container) for recycling rather than the KeystoneTrash Mountain be relieved of our collection? What is the holdup and who is responsible for resolving the issue?) Received a

not-in-my-court but I'm working on it anyway answer.

For those inferested in the answer:

- The Recycling Center is not currently collecting commingles (sic) (which seems redundant to me as I wouldn't be "saving" my blue container deposits if I didn't already know this) and this is beyond the CIty's control (which begs the question, have you met with the County Commissioners).

However, the City is looking into alternative recycling centers and programs o Answer to the question "When will the City join all of the others (sic) municipalities in the County and base the property taxes on a single assessed property value": The CIty will look into this request (to which I say thank you).

However, we note that the lack of county assessment hinders our ability to have accurate assessment at the City level (to which I say, Are you lobbying the County Commissioners? How many times have you met with them on this issue?)

O To the question "Why was the 2020

real estate tax levy only on land and not improvements." The answer was correct but my question should have specified the Council increase which I believed Mr. Gaughan has answered as it was because Mr. Bulzoni asked.

O The final question dealt with the CIty's pulling the two-Fire Engine Stations from use as polling places after the final list was published as I thought it was only fair the City should then also notify registered voters of those polling places of the last minute changes.

I will hold the balance of my questions and comments, save one each, until next week.

- The Question: Was the March 2019 request for a Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP) grant for the renovation of the Municipal Building rejected by the State?
- The Comment: When will the answers to the many other questions from me and other requesters be forthcoming.

(End of Public Comment.)

MR. GAUGHAN: Mrs. Reed?

1 MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5 - A . MOTIONS. 2 3 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Mrs. Reed. 4 Councilman Schuster, do you have any motions or 5 comments at this time? MR. SCHUSTER: The only comment I'd 6 like to make is it's nice to see businesses 7 8 start opening and us moving into some more 9 lenient phases. 10 MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. Thank you. 11 Councilman McAndrew, do you have any motions or 12 comments? 13 MR. MCANDREW: Yes, I have a few. 14 So last week two questions were posed to me by 15 concerned citizens. And then I relayed them to Mrs. Reed to reach out to Chief Graziano. 16 17 then also the one that came today I want to 18 address. 19 So the one -- thank you, first of 20 all, Chief Graziano, for your swift responses 21 to these concerned citizens. So the first 22 question last week was how many text while 23 driving citations have been issued. 24 So he responded and said 37 since 25 2016. And it has been implemented but

difficult to enforce. An example being, you know, a driver has to admit to it, first of all, and/or an officer has to actually witness a person sending or receiving a text.

But in light of that, also what could be a little confusing is when this is being observed, the driver might be using his GPS, which is not considered texting. He might be scrolling through a number or dialling a number. So I hope that answers the question of that concerned citizen.

The second one was how do we get a speed bump study done? And the response from the Chief was speed bumps are actually illegal. They're not allowed in the City streets. They could cause damage to City vehicles. You know, an example, you know, of the DPW trucks our blades during plowing.

And these are also safety issues with trucks and drivers. So any that have been illegally constructed bumps that have been found around the City have been removed. So thanks for that answer.

And then today we received a public comment question from Mrs. Nestor. And her

question was other places she has lived allowed citizen ride-alongs with the police. She called a couple years ago and was told Scranton does not allow this.

As a way of being transparent and allowing involvement and understanding, Scranton Police should allow citizens to do a ride-along. So the Chief had, you know, his response was, we do have a very active ride-along program and has been in place for many years.

This individual, maybe Mrs. Nestor, might have called the police department asking about this maybe during the Covid -- COVID-19 restrictions. And if that's the case, we obviously have the program currently suspended because of restrictions.

However, it will be opened up once again as the COVID-19 restrictions are released. So at that point, you know, she could inquire again. And that's all I have. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Councilman McAndrew. Dr. Rothchild, do you have any motions or comments?

DR. ROTHCHILD: No, I don't have any. No, I don't have any motions or comments at this time. Thank you.

MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Dr.

Rothchild. Councilman Donahue, do you have any motions or comments at this time?

MR. DONAHUE: Quick comment.

Yesterday I met with Tom Preambo the new
Director of DPW. And I just want to thank him
for taking the time out of his schedule. We
just went over a couple of initiatives that
will be upcoming and, you know, what we see are
some of the deficiencies, you know, within DPW
and how we can better operate.

And I was also made aware today that I know we were told that the ad for the RFP for the engineering service for street paving went out last week. But they needed to make a couple corrections to it regarding ADA ramps. So that will -- I believe that's going to go out either later -- it either went out later this afternoon to the Times for the ad or it will go out tomorrow morning. So it should be in the paper the next couple days there.

Miss Reed, would we be able to send

correspondence to the administration regarding the reopening of City Hall and what processes we're going to use moving forward with that?

MS. REED: Certainly.

MR. DONAHUE: On top of that too, just some questions on the furloughs because as we reopen City Hall, hopefully, you know, some of the people that -- some of the City employees that have been furloughed will be called back.

So what will be the process -- and I could send all of this to you in an e-mail too. But what will be the process on how they will be called back, when will they be called back, how many won't be called back. And if there's even the slightest possibility that any worker won't be called back, you know, the administration has to just be up front and honest with those employees instead of keeping them in the dark on their employment status.

And I think Council also needs to be provided with detailed explanations of who will take on the duties of these positions if those employees -- if certain employees aren't called back. And also just who is performing the work

now?

A couple examples, who's processing garbage bills? Who's performing health inspections of restaurants? Who's performing housing inspections? Who's responding to quality of life complaints? Who's overseeing the bidding and purchasing process, just as a couple of examples.

So we'll pass that along to the administration and see what kind of answers we get. And that's all I have for tonight.

MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. Thank you,
Councilman Donahue. I just have one comment.
I'd like for a letter to be sent to the Mayor
and the City Law Department and City Solicitor
Jessica Eskra. I would like an update in
regards to Northeast Revenue Services and the
conditions that were stated in Attorney Eskra's
letter to Sean Shamany from NRS on October
16th, 2019.

Specifically I would like a copy of all correspondence between the City of Scranton and NRS from January 1st, 2014 to present. As part of this correspondence back in 2019, the City asked that the NRS ensure the prompt

exchange of all databases in a format acceptable to the City for all tax and refuse collection to the City and/or its designee. I would like to know if that has happened yet.

NRS's IT Department and the City's IT Department would agree to work together in good faith to achieve a timely transition of data. I'd like to know if that has occurred yet. NRS will upload the 2019 payments to its server to be combined with the data that will be transferred to the City and/or its designee. I'd like to know if that has happened yet.

NRS will proceed with the filing of delinquent refuse liens for Calendar Year 2018, has the same already been prepared and ready for filing. It says, however, NRS will not proceed with the filing of 2018 delinquent tax liens. I'd like to get an update on that and know if that has happened yet.

Also, it states that NRS will provide the City with a total dollar amount of cost advanced on liens that have been filed on behalf of the City. At that time the City wanted to see this amount within ten business days of October 16th, 2019. So I'd like to

know if that had occurred.

And the City would require assurances in writing from NRS that the termination of this contract would not result in litigation. And I'd like to know if that has happened yet. So, Mrs. Reed, and Solicitor Hayes, if you could put that together and get that out to the Law Department and the Mayor and I would appreciate it. And that's all I have. Mrs. Reed?

So I'm all about being fair and equitable. There's a rule. I follow the rules. This is my vote and I'll own this vote.

And I'm okay with this vote. So thank you.
