25	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Mrs. Reed.

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1	Are there any comments on any of the Third
2	Order items? I just have one comment on 3-D
3	payroll overtime report that was submitted by
4	Controller John Murray.
5	As I mentioned in the caucus, there
6	I think was in speaking with the Mayor and
7	Controller Murray, there may have been a
8	discrepancy in the bottom line number, the
9	total amount of overtime listed in the report.
10	So they are working to correct that.
11	I am personally concerned that we are over
12	budget with police and fire overtime. We
13	budgeted \$700,000 overtime for the police
14	department. We are overbudget about
15	\$62,398.46. That's concerning.
16	Fire is very concerning. We
17	budgeted \$325,000 for overtime. We're already
18	at \$443,825.63. So we're overbudget by
19	\$118,825.63.
20	The Law Department there was no
21	overtime budgeted for 2020. It's not a large
22	amount. But I still would like to know what,
23	you know, how we why we had to spend
24	overtime in the Law Department, \$1,161.74.
25	So what I'd like to ask from the

7 1 administration is in writing an explanation as to why in November we're that much over in the 2 3 fire department and in the police department. In years past in the police department there 4 5 have been a certain amount of dollars that were reimbursable. This is most likely the case 6 again this year. 7 So usually Chief Graziano would give 8 9 us a breakdown on the costs to date that were reimbursable, whether a policeman were to cover 10 11 an event or something like that. But, 12 Mrs. Reed, if you could send something to the 13 administration for an answer in writing as to 14 the reasons why we're so over in these 15 categories. 16 Anyone else on the question -- or 17 not on the question. Anyone else on the Third 18 Order items? If not, received and filed. Do 19 any Council members have any announcements at this time? 20 21 MR. MCANDREW: I have a quick one. 22 This Saturday, November 7th from 4 to 7 p.m., 23 there will be a pot roast dinner fundraiser 24 hosted by God's Peace at Parker and Main, which 25 is 2506 North Main Avenue, take out only \$12

1	each.
2	Advanced tickets need to be
3	purchased. Tickets are available at the church
4	office. And, you know, the Facebook page
5	directs you to a website where you could
6	actually purchase tickets. That's all I have.
7	Thank you.
8	MR. DONAHUE: I have one quick one.
9	Just a reminder about the fall leaf program.
10	All leaves must be placed in biodegradable
11	brown paper bags. There's bags available for
12	pickup at the DPW complex on Popular Street and
13	at the Weston Field house on Providence Road.
14	All collections are from the
15	curbside of streets and avenues. No
16	collections will be in courts or alleys. No
17	loose piles, no plastic bags, no household
18	trash in leaf bags. The following weeks are
19	the remaining weeks of the program:
20	Next week, the week of November 9th;
21	the week of November 24th; and the week of
22	December 7th.
23	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Anyone
24	else?
25	DR. ROTHCHILD: Yes, I have one

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1	thing to add. So I know last week we had we
2	had them in the Scranton Tomorrow. And they
3	were talking about the rally for restaurants
4	event that they host over at Lackawanna
5	College.
6	And I think there's one more event.
7	It's going to be November 24th with
8	reservations starting at 5:30 p.m. I think
9	there is one also I'm sorry that one will be
10	with Electronic City Bakehouse. And that's
11	going to be a four course meal.
12	And then there's another one
13	Tuesday, November 10th. Reservations starting
14	at 5:30. And that's going to be with Posh at
15	the Scranton Club.
16	So all the information about the
17	rally for restaurant events are on the Facebook
18	page of 409 on Adams at Lackawanna College.
19	And it's just a great way to be able to support
20	our local restaurant and businesses and get a
21	great meal out of it. So I'd just encourage
22	people to check it out.
23	MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. Thank you. I
24	have a few. Mary Mother of God Parish is going
25	to have their annual roast beef dinner Sunday,

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1	November 8th, 2020, 12 noon to 4 p.m., at
2	Stirna's Restaurant on West Market Street in
3	North Scranton.
4	This will be take out only due to
5	the pandemic. Adults can pay \$10 in advance or
6	\$12 at the door. We have a caucus scheduled
7	with Herbert Rowland and Grubic for Tuesday,
8	November 10th at 5:45 p.m., to discuss the
9	City's approach to stormwater management and
10	the progress that has occurred with this
11	company working with the City on the pollution
12	reduction plan and complying with the pollution
13	reduction requirements by the EPA.
14	We're also going to get an update on
15	what has been accomplished in terms of best
16	management practices the City should implement
17	to maintain the MS4 permit and the expiration
18	of the feasibility and benefits of managing
19	stormwater on a regional basis.
20	City Hall will be closed tomorrow
21	Tuesday, November 3rd for Election Day holiday.
22	The DPW will also be off tomorrow. Refuse and
23	blue recycling will be one day behind starting
24	on Wednesday of this week.
25	Next week, Thursday, November 12th

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1	at 6 p.m., Council will hold the first of two
2	work sessions with the Mayor and Business
3	Administrator for the purpose of discussing
4	2021 operating budget. This will be
5	livestreamed and on ECTV for the public to
6	view.
7	I gave kind of a breakdown of the
8	budget timeline in the caucus. In addition to
9	the work session that will be held on Thursday,
10	November 12th, there will be another one held
11	on Thursday, November 19th with the same
12	format.
13	Similar to the last two weeks,
14	OECD's Executive Director is asking that
15	Council make an announcement regarding
16	Wednesday, October 21st, 2020, applications
17	will be available for the City of Scranton's
18	Community Development Block Grant Program, Home
19	Investment Partnership Program and the
20	Emergency Solutions Grant administered by the
21	U.S. Department of Housing and Urban
22	Development.
23	Project activities must be
24	consistent with the needs and objectives
25	identified in the City of Scranton's Five Year

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1	Consolidated Plan principally for extremely
2	low, low, and moderate income families.
3	Eligible applicants must be
4	incorporated for profit, nonprofit or public
5	organizations or businesses able to undertake
6	their approved activity within the boundaries
7	of the City of Scranton.
8	Applications are available online at
9	www.scrantonworks.org and must be submitted
10	electronically no later than 5 p.m., on Friday,
11	November 20th, 2020.
12	Public Comment on the CDBG Home or
13	ESG Programs will be accepted at the November
14	10th, 2020 Council meeting scheduled at 6:30
15	p.m.

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1	MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS
2	PARTICIPATION.
3	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Mrs. Reed.
4	At this time, would someone please make a
5	motion to accept public comment from the
6	following individuals, Abby Walsh, Marie
7	Schumacher, and Fay Franus.
8	MR. DONAHUE: So moved.
9	DR. ROTHCHILD: Second.
10	MR. GAUGHAN: There's been a motion
11	and a second to accept public comment.
12	Mrs. Reed, would you please read the comments
13	into the record?
14	MS. REED: Thank you. The first
15	submission is from Abby Walsh as follows:
16	I was recently reading through the
17	Act 47 legislation and had a question regarding
18	our coordinator's powers. In subchapter B,
19	Section 221, one of the coordinator's powers is
20	as follows, to "investigate the tax-exempt
21	status of any property. Within a distressed
22	municipality. And advise the governing body of
23	the municipality to appeal the assessment or
24	exempt status of property within the distressed
25	municipality."

14 1 I was not alive when we first entered distressed status, so I am unaware if 2 3 this was ever done. I am wondering if our 4 coordinator Gerald Cross ever used this power 5 to look into tax-exempt properties within the city and perhaps advised the city to appeal the 6 status of any of them. 7 8 If not, perhaps he could look into 9 it now, or even if he has done it in the past, 10 it may be worth investigating more properties 11 in the near future so we can utilize his 12 expertise and increase the tax base as we move 13 to exit distressed status soon. 14 MS. REED: Again, that was from Abby 15 Walsh. 16 The next submission is from Marie 17 Schumacher as follows: 18 0 What progress, if any, has been 19 made to expedite the 2019 AUDIT? HR'S Internal Audit of employee's 20 0 21 currency on taxes and fees is scheduled to 22 begin at the beginning of December giving any 23 delinquent employees about six weeks to get 24 current. When will this Audit complete and 25 what, if anything, will happen to any remaining

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1	delinquent employees?
2	0 On October 20th the Capital
3	Budget was taken from the table and placed in
4	seventh order where it was approved with some
5	change. The revised Budget was not included on
6	the Agenda as it was taken from the table so my
7	question is where on-line is the "official"
8	Capital Budget available.
9	Also, I do not believe several of my
10	Capital Budget questions were answered; those
11	being:
12	- an asphalt Paving and small roller
13	is requested but I see no request for equipment
14	to tar around pave patches; without the tar
15	water gets between the old and new asphalt and
16	the pothole is back.
17	- brush tractor and mower new or
18	replacement?. The roadside brush along East
19	Mountain Road and Route 307 between Rt 81 and
20	Lynwood Avenue was not trimmed back this year
21	as it has been in years past. Also, Land Bank
22	vacant properties need to be maintained.
23	- I see two (separate line items I
24	might add and question) for Leaf Vacuum Trucks
25	but no Street Sweepers. Is our street sweeper

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1	inventory sufficient to keep sediment
2	stormwater out of the stormwater drains.?
3	- The DPW vehicle narrative states
4	vehicles in need of replacement and fleet
5	additions and then provides a list but fails to
6	distinguish between which are replacement and
7	which are additions. This was answered but
8	included an Excel sheet that I do not believe
9	has been made available to the public.
10	- The Flood Control section states
11	escrow accounts will be used for funding.
12	Please identify the available escrow accounts
13	and the balance in each.and answer why this
14	available funding has not been used to fix the
15	Dewey-Jackson St issue? The Dewey-Jackson St.
16	Portion was answered but not the escrow account
17	identification and balances.
18	0 Speaking of answers to questions;
19	it's been a significant length of time since
20	the questions not answered during the Meeting
21	have been answered. I am especially interested
22	in questions relative to that large-orange sign
23	saying NO PARKING at River St. And Prospect
24	Avenue.
25	0 Will there be a presentation

17 1 prior to receipt of the Budget that exposes the planned expenditures over the next five years 2 3 at the former Serrenti building. It appears the 4 concerns expressed by Council prior to 5 permitting the acquisition are transitioning to reality at a time the CIty is financially 6 7 distressed enough that the Act 47 exit had to 8 be postponed for 18 months. 9 Finally, if you are still 0 10 reluctant to use Council Chambers, may I 11 sugggest you hold the Public Hearing on the 12 City's 2021 Budget at the Cultural Center and 13 provide each speaker at least 10 minutes and 14 accept any questions over the ten minutes in 15 writing for timely answers. 16 17 MS. REED: The third submission is 18 from Fay Franus and it is as follows: 19 Council, 20 You say you answer questions that 21 the residents of Scranton ask. May I 22 say--BARELY if at all--You make it sound like 23 you do, but that is not true. Example Marie 24 Schumacher has questions from weeks and weeks 25 ago perhaps months that seriously needed

answers to.

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2	And were never answered. You are
3	counting on people not remembering these
4	questions so you can get away without answering
5	them ON PURPOSE!
6	I asked each council member directly
7	last week to explain to the residents why they
8	felt it was not good to fight for the 50
9	million the city took out in LST taxes
10	illegally-NOT a sound out of you. Which
11	reaffirms you are NOT representing the people
12	but only the administration.
13	Now you will continue to tax the
14	people right out of their homes. BUT you do not
15	care! You wouldn't even fight for the people
16	you wanted to side with the administration.
17	I've asked numerous time about the
18	auditwhy do you hire people that get paid
19	lots pf money but yet never have it done on
20	time. Time to find another company.Year after
21	year we keep asking when is the audit going to
22	be done. You never seem to correct your
23	mistakes.
24	Are the taxpayers going to have to
25	pay \$300.00 again for their garbage fee when
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19 1 25% of the people do not pay theirs-- So our \$300.00 pays for those who don't pay!. The 2 3 people in Scranton should know this city has a 4 law in place for the DPW not to pick up the 5 garbage of those homes who do NOT pay their garbage fee. BUT the city and council will not 6 7 abide by their won law. 8 In the meantime, the people who do 9 pay will have to continue to pay for those who 10 do NOT! I know I keep quoting this city law but 11 maybe it needs repeating. Maybe just maybe it 12 might matter to you to follow laws that are in 13 place to help the resident. God Forbid that 14 should happen! 15 Last question. What exactly do each 16 of you do for the \$12,500.00 we pay you every 17 year to help us. 18 (This concludes letters as submitted 19 to Council for public comment.) 20 21 MS. REED: That concludes the 22 citizens participation. 23 MR. GAUGHAN: Okay. Thank you, Mrs. 24 I just want to on the question start off Reed. 25 by reading Mr. Cross's response into the

20 1 Miss Walsh who posed a question about record. Act 47 legislation and regarding coordinator's 2 3 powers in terms of investigating the tax exempt 4 status of any property within a distressed 5 municipality. It was a very good question. And I want to take a second to read the 6 7 response that I received this afternoon from 8 Mr. Cross. 9 Mr. Cross said: Miss Walsh is 10 correct in that the coordinator can review the 11 status of exempt from taxation properties. The 12 various recovery plans included initiatives for 13 the City to review the status of these 14 properties on a regular basis. The first review was conducted 15 16 during the first recovery plan of 1992. More 17 recently, the coordinator reviewed the status 18 of various properties during preparation of the 19 2015 recovery plan revision. 20 Also at that time a review was 21 conducted as part of Amoroso plan at that same 22 The City did attempt to review the time. 23 properties as part of the 2015 recovery 24 process. And I believe that some properties 25 were identified at that time as subject to

review.

2	Additionally the disposition of
3	several properties that were part of closed
4	churches were also identified as potential
5	change of use that could lead to a resumption
6	of taxable status. The majority of exempt
7	properties are owned by local government, city,
8	county, and school district and educational and
9	medical facilities.
10	The sale of the Scranton Sewer
11	Authority also led to some properties being
12	reclassified as taxable. Also, the sale of the
13	not-for-profit to a for profit entity allowed
14	that property to be returned to the tax rolls.
15	We believe that a regular review of
16	the status of properties that are owned by
17	not-for-profit entities but which uses are not
18	directly related to their charitable function
19	should occur to determine their taxable status.
20	While the coordinator does not
21	actually perform the analysis, the City has had
22	initiatives and recovery plans to perform such
23	an analysis. Please let me know if there are
24	any followup questions regarding exempt from
25	taxation properties.

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1	I do know for a fact that that is in
2	our recovery plan. And it has been in several
3	recovery plans since I've been on Council that
4	initiative to analyze the tax exempt
5	properties. And I have asked repeatedly,
6	repeatedly for that to be done. And it has not
7	yet been done.
8	So, Mrs. Reed, if we can send
9	correspondence to the Mayor and I'll bring
10	this up the next time I talk with the Mayor
11	on what their plans are or if they do have
12	plans to perform that analysis.
13	Again, this is not something that
14	Council would be able to undertake. That would
15	have to be the administration. But I do
16	support that. I think it makes sense.
17	As for Miss Schumacher's comments on
18	the capital budget that she claims is taken
19	from the table and placed in Seventh Order
20	where it was approved with some change, the
21	only change that was made there that I had
22	requested was for the administration to show
23	what funds they had already have already
24	been allocated for capital programs and
25	projects.

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1	And that they did include that.
2	I can't remember if that was included in Third
3	Order. If it wasn't, I will ask that that be
4	included in Third Order that updated
5	spreadsheet.
6	But there was no material changes
7	made to the capital budget. Otherwise, we
8	would have had to make an amendment to that.
9	So we will get Miss Schumacher that capital
10	budget. And we'll put the revised spreadsheet
11	in there. That was my mistake. If that wasn't
12	included, I apologize for that.
13	As for the DPW questions, I was
14	under the impression that all of them were
15	answered. There are some here that Miss
16	Schumacher is claiming weren't answered. We
17	will get those to the DPW and make sure that
18	those are answered.
19	And let me see. Miss Schumacher
20	also mentioned that it's been a significant
21	length of since questions she had
22	questions that were not answered. I actually
23	did talk to Mrs. Reed today, our City Clerk
24	about that.
25	And I asked her if she would reach

24 1 out to the Mayor's office to get an update on the status of those questions. Every time a 2 3 member of the public issues a -- asks a question of this Council, I make sure if I 4 5 don't have the answer right at my disposal and I don't know off the top of my head and it's 6 not something that's on the agenda that we get 7 those questions to the administration. 8 9 And we have asked them to answer 10 those questions. So we are not in any way --11 and I am not in any way ignoring anybody's 12 I would not do that. That would be questions. 13 a dereliction of duty on my part. It would be 14 ignorant as well. 15 We have not received a response yet 16 from the administration. So again, we did ask 17 or I did ask Mrs. Reed today to ask the 18 administration for an update on when we can 19 expect the answers to these questions and 20 including the no parking sign at River Street 21 and Prospect Avenue. 22 Miss Schumacher also asked a 23 question about the Serrenti building. She 24 asked for a -- planned expenditures over the 25 next five years. We can ask for that. Ι

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1	wasn't for that project a few years ago.
2	I thought there was issues. I'm not
3	going to rehash them all night. The problem is
4	that, you know, you can't put toothpaste back
5	in the tube. We have acquired that building.
6	There's been significant amount of money that
7	has been put in that building.
8	We did receive a breakdown of how
9	the money has been spent. Most of it has been
10	grant money. But it just wouldn't make sense
11	at this point since we already have acquired
12	the building and we put money into it to just
13	abandon the project.
14	So while I didn't agree with it
15	originally, at this point it would not make
16	sense to abandon it and to scrap it. But I
17	will ask what the plans are for expenditures
18	over the next five years.
19	And finally, about the use of
20	Council Chambers and Miss Schumacher's
21	suggestion about the 2021 budget at the
22	Cultural Center, we are not going to do that.
23	There would be a cost to that on using the
24	Cultural Center, a user fee or host fee or
25	whatever.

1 So we're not going to do that. Speakers have five minutes to -- they have five 2 3 minutes with their questions. They could put 4 those in writing. We will take them. We will 5 get them answered for the public when the budget comes up on our agenda. 6 But we are 7 going to continue to operate in Zoom due to the 8 pandemic. 9 And just to address finally Miss 10 Franus's comment, I wasn't here last week about 11 the City's court case that they won with the 12 LST taxes. I said it before and I'll say it 13 If the City lost that, then we would again. 14 probably have gone bankrupt. 15 So, you know, you're really -- I 16 appreciate Miss Franus's comments, but you're 17 cutting off your nose to spite your face. Ιf 18 you are rooting for a victory there, then the 19 City is going to be in horrible financial 20 peril. And we'll probably end up going 21 bankrupt when you don't have tens of millions of dollars of revenue to run the City. 22 So 23 that's my answer to that. 24 And I think that was it. And again, 25 if there is any -- any questions here that we

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1	got like we do every week we will send those to
2	the administration. And we'll ask them for an
3	update and when we could expect the answers.
4	Anyone else on the question? Okay. All those
5	in favor signify by saying aye.
6	MR. SCHUSTER: Aye.
7	MR. MCANDREW: Aye.
8	MR. DONAHUE: Aye.
9	DR. ROTHCHILD: Aye.
10	MR. GAUGHAN: Aye. Opposed? The
11	ayes have it and so moved.
12	MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.
13	MOTIONS.
14	MR. GAUGHAN: Councilman Schuster,
15	do you have any motions or comments at this
16	time?
17	MR. SCHUSTER: No, nothing at this
18	time.
19	MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Councilman
20	McAndrew, any motions or comments?
21	MR. MCANDREW: I don't have a
22	motion. But I have a quick comment. So a
23	couple of weeks ago we talked about we passed
24	some legislation we had some money to change
25	out all the City signs and replace them which,

you know, was great.

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2	A citizen approached me about it.
3	His name is Derek Rains. He's from the Hill
4	Section, Monroe Avenue. He experienced this
5	and something like this when he worked at
6	Tobyhanna Depot. So his suggestion which was a
7	pretty good idea, you know, I don't know what
8	we're going to do with the signs the old
9	signs; but maybe people might want to buy them.
10	I mean, he said he would love to buy
11	the Monroe sign. I'd take a St. Ann Street
12	sign in a minute. So maybe we pose this to the
13	City and say, hey, you know, before you get rid
14	of the signs, maybe we could get a couple bucks
15	in revenue, you know, let's maybe throw it out
16	there.
17	It might be a couple dollars to sort
18	them or whatever, but it might be an idea to
19	throw it out there to see if anybody would like
20	to buy this as a memento or, you know, a street
21	sign that's been on their street. So,
22	Mrs. Reed, would you just send maybe that
23	correspondence over to the administration to

4	question as to there was multiple interns
5	being offered permanent employment
6	opportunities. So I had asked for a list of
7	those interns who were hired full time.
8	Also in the caucus I had asked about
9	the incident that occurred a few weeks ago with
10	the police department and a political parade
11	that was that the police department kind of
12	chaperoned through the City.
13	I did speak with the Mayor and the
14	Chief of Police and was told that there was an
15	investigation going on about that. And then I
16	have not heard anything in about two weeks. So
17	I did ask Mrs. Reed if she would send something
18	to get an update on that. I'd like to know who
19	authorized it and the details. I think it's
20	important.
21	I also asked in the caucus when the
22	City will know how much we're going to be
23	reimbursed from the county for the COVID-19
24	expenditures and what the timeline looks like
25	on that. I believe that we submitted at this

1	point nearly a million dollars. So I'm just
2	not clear on what the process is and when we'll
3	find out.
4	Also, there was a transfer that was
5	received for the workers' comp account to
6	unemployment insurance in the amount of
7	\$179,000. Mrs. Reed, if you could find out
8	what the total amount that the City has spent
9	this year in unemployment insurance, I'd like
10	to know that prior to the next meeting.
11	Also, we talked a little bit about
12	and I brought up the audit. And I did have a
13	chance this week to speak to the Business
14	Administrator about it. I think we all
15	expressed two weeks ago that it's just simply
16	unacceptable to receive the audit in December
17	of 2020 the 2019 audit in December of 2020.
18	Last year we received the 2018 audit
19	in January of 2019, which was unacceptable as
20	well. And at that time we had asked for
21	regular updates on the audit. We were told
22	that it was going to be done on time and
23	everybody was going have their act together.
24	So I just want to go through really
25	quick what Kelly Lindsey from the Kohanski

1 2	32 Company had sent us that they agree that the

	December 31st, 2019 audit of financial
3	statements being received in midDecember, 2020
4	is not acceptable.
5	And at the conclusion of the
6	December 31st, 2018 audit they discussed with
7	Council at length and agreed that a September

10	received all of their requested financial
11	information by July 1st which gave the City six
12	months to prepare.
13	Then she details the reports that

20	On October 1st they received trial
21	balances and some work papers for the general
22	fund, special city's fund in OECD, a partial

24	they attached and additional items were going
25	to be requested as they worked through the

2	They expressed to us that they're
3	working diligently to accommodate the City
4	audit in their schedule after receiving the
5	information later than they had planned and
6	will do everything possible to deliver the
7	audit as soon as it is reasonably possible.
8	She did offer up other items to
9	consider. The City has a new business manager.

And I think5we should have this audit, you know, before6final passage of the budget in December7December 15th. So if you could ask them what8the plan of action is. Mr. Deeley told me the9he's going to now meet weekly with Kohanski au10Company to get further updates but very11disappointing.12The other thing we talked about in13Third Order was the overtime cost. We're going14to be sending something to the administration15so that they could explain the reasons in16detail in writing as to why we're over in the17police and fire overtime budget.18Also, we're going to ask for what19the deal is on the DPW equipment donation from20Keystone Landfill.
