16 SINGLE TAX OFFICE CITY FUNDS DISTRIBUTED
17 COMPARISON REPORT 2017-2018 YEAR TO DATE
18 APRIL 30, 2018.

19 MR. PERRY: Are there any comments?
20 If not, received and filed.

21 MS. REED: 3-B. TAX ASSESSOR'S
22 REPORT FOR HEARING DATE TO BE HELD MAY 16,
23 2018.

24 MR. PERRY: Are there any comments?
25 If not, received and filed. Do any council

1 members have announcements at this time?

2 MR. DONAHUE: Yeah, I do. The
3 Lackawanna County Land Bank has applied for
4 and received a local share account grant in
5 the amount of \$65,000 to establish a White
6 to Bright Program in Lackawanna County. The
7 Land Bank has joined with Neighbor Works of
8 Northeastern PA to present a series of town
9 hall public meetings in various Lackawanna
10 County communities to discuss and identify
11 the cause of blight, advertise the White to
12 Blight Program and to help them to
13 prioritize their immediate needs. The first
14 of these town hall meetings will be held on
15 Wednesday, May 23, 2018, at 6:00 p.m. at
16 Goodwill at North, 1539 North Main Avenue in
17 Scranton. And the mediator -- or that's all
18 I have. Thank you.

19 MR. PERRY: Any other councilmen? I
20 have one announcement. There will be a
21 motion no suspend council rules to move Item
22 6-B, extending the 10 percent waste disposal
23 discount period, to Seventh Order for final
24 passage this evening. If anyone would like
25 to speak on this particular piece of

1 legislation, they may do so during Fourth,
2 citizens' participation. Thank you. Fourth
3 Order Citizen's participation.

4 (The following speakers offered
5 public comment: Ray Pilch spoke on matter
6 of general concern. Bob Bolus spoke on
7 agenda items and matters of general concern.
8 Lee Morgan spoke on city business and
9 matters of general concern. Joan Hodowanitz
10 spoke on agenda items and matters of general
11 concern. John Marrow spoke on matter of
12 general concern. Marie Schumacher spoke on
13 city business and matters of general
14 concern. Dave Dobrzyn spoke on matters of
15 general concern.)

16 MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.

17 MOTIONS.

18 MR. PERRY: Mr. Donahue, any motions
19 or comments tonight?

20 MR. DONAHUE: Yes, just quickly. As
21 a follow-up to Councilman Gaughan's request
22 from a few weeks ago I had also sent a
23 request for an update on the status of the
24 Crowley Park renovation project that was
25 announced in the fall. And also last week

1 we received a notification that the city
2 issued an RFQ for special labor counsel
3 sometime last week. Councilman Gaughan and
4 myself will be sending a request for a
5 meeting with the Law Department to, you
6 know, hopefully get this delayed awarding
7 this contract because this is something
8 that's coming up in our shared services
9 committee meetings as a possible shared
10 service between the school district and the
11 city.

12 Also, in light of the fact that
13 garbage bills have not still gone out, I
14 have requested that Mrs. Reed send the
15 Treasurer's Office a request to provide a
16 memo detailing any and all issues that have
17 prevented the bills from going out in a
18 timely manner so that hopefully next year we
19 could get this issue addressed.

20 And then lastly, I'm not going to
21 dignify the Majority Commissioner Cummings
22 ignorant and, quite frankly, despicable
23 comments at last week's commissioner's
24 meeting with a lengthy response, but I must
25 say that in light of the opioid epidemic

1 that is racing throughout our community,
2 it's disgusting that we have an elected
3 official who is so stubbornly ignorant
4 towards actual facts. That's all I have.

5 MR. PERRY: Thank you, Mr. Donahue.
6 Mr. Evans, any motions or comments tonight?

7 MR. EVANS: I do, and I will dignify
8 the comments that were made last week. I'm
9 going to talk about medical marijuana so,
10 like I say, I just can't help myself. The
11 comments made at last week's or recently at
12 on the of the county commissioner's meeting
13 should not be ignored. First of all, it's
14 very clear that one of the commissioners has
15 strong negative feelings toward the
16 burgeoning industry of medical marijuana.

17 So let me be perfectly clear, this
18 city council welcomes the industry to the
19 City of Scranton, even if there are unwanted
20 or is unwanted by other elected officials at
21 the county level. We want your
22 dispensaries, we welcome your growing
23 facilities, we welcome your jobs, we welcome
24 your commerce and we welcome your mission.

25 I was somewhat dumbfounded learning

1 that a county commissioner who railed
2 against the medical marijuana industry did
3 not know that the state legislature passed
4 into law the use of medical marijuana in
5 2016. For the record, the Republican
6 controlled House voted 149 to 43 in favor.
7 The Republican lead Senate voted 42 to 7 in
8 favor. In the divided political climate
9 that we live in, that's a landslide.

10 On a more personal level I found
11 many of the comments made by the
12 commissioner almost heartbreaking, and while
13 the level of misinformation was certainly
14 evidence it was a lack of compassion in some
15 of the statements I found most disturbing.
16 If I may I'd like to explain my comment a
17 little further. My mother spent 32 years of
18 the 72 years she had on this earth battling
19 various types of cancer. I cannot even
20 count the times she received chemotherapy
21 treatments during those decades. I only
22 wish at the time that she could have had
23 access to medical marijuana because if it
24 gave her one day of relief from the severe
25 nausea and gave her one day of comfort from

1 the constant pain it would have been a gift.

2 The study from the Journal of the
3 American Medical Association stated that
4 states that allow medical marijuana,
5 including Pennsylvania, have seen a 6
6 percent drop in opioid prescriptions. I
7 only wish that the daughter of one of my
8 best friends could have had the opportunity
9 and access to medical marijuana and that
10 somehow she could have been one of those 6
11 percent and maybe she would be alive today
12 and my friend would still have his daughter
13 and her daughter would still have her mom.

14 As we all know, words have
15 consequences and millions of people who seek
16 relief and comfort through the use of
17 medical marijuana are not stupid, they just
18 want help. That's all I have for tonight.
19 Thank you.

20 MR. PERRY: Thank you, Mr. Evans.
21 Mr. Gaughan, any motions or comments
22 tonight?

23 MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, just a few.
24 First, I'd agree with Councilman Donahue on
25 asking the treasurer for an estimation on

1 why the garbage bills have taken so long to
2 go out. Quite frankly, there are people in
3 this city who budget for this every year and
4 they are waiting for it so, I mean, the
5 city, you know, goes to people and says that
6 they need this money every year and they
7 don't really act like it, so I do think that
8 an explanation is warranted and, you know,
9 we had this legislation on our agenda and it
10 really should have come as backup with the
11 legislation. If we are going to ask for a
12 deadline, we should have an explanation from
13 the administration as to why it's taking so
14 long to get the garbage bills out.

15 Secondly, I just want to read into
16 the record a letter that Councilman Donahue,
17 Councilman Perry and I are going to send out
18 to Mr. Justin Davis, the CEO of Moses Taylor
19 Hospital regarding the recent strike with
20 the nurses.

21 "Dear Mr. Davis, the Council of the
22 City of Scranton strongly supports the
23 nurses at Moses Taylor Hospital who are
24 exercising their right to stand up for a
25 fair union contract and improve working

1 conditions and increase the quality of the
2 patient care in our region. Our
3 constituents and all patients throughout
4 Northeastern Pennsylvania deserve the
5 highest quality of care. That care is
6 compromised when hospitals are understaffed
7 causing nurses to be pulled from unit to
8 unit and forced to work overtime when they
9 are undeniably exhausted. We are grateful
10 to the Moses Taylor nurses who are standing
11 up for patient care and holding Commonwealth
12 Health accountable for putting profits
13 before patients.

14 As the women and men on the front
15 lines, nurses must have a voice in how care
16 is delivered to their patients. For more
17 than a year, the dedicated nurses at Moses
18 Taylor Hospital have been trying to address
19 critical staffing issues that they believe
20 could compromise patient care. In response,
21 Commonwealth Health has let their contracts
22 expire and engage in unfair labor practices.
23 Commonwealth Health has a responsibility to
24 the community we represent and it is time to
25 agree to union contracts that put patient

1 care before profits. We are proud to stand
2 with Moses Taylor nurses."

3 And we will be sending that out once
4 the three of us sign it.

5 Secondly, I'd like to make a motion
6 that Scranton City Council invite Mayor
7 Courtright and his administration along with
8 the Pennsylvania Economy League to a public
9 caucus in council chambers for the purpose
10 of discussing the Act 47 exit plan for the
11 City of Scranton that was adopted by this
12 council in July of 2017.

13 MR. PERRY: There's a motion on the
14 floor, do I have a second?

15 MR. DONAHUE: I'll second that.

16 MR. PERRY: There's a motion and a
17 second. On the question?

18 MR. GAUGHAN: Yes, on the question.
19 I mentioned this last week but I just wanted
20 to put it into motion form, I think this
21 caucus is extremely important for a number
22 of different reasons. Number one, to get an
23 update a year late on any progress that's
24 been made towards several provisions within
25 the exit plan. Work force cost containment,

1 debt management policy recommendations,
2 worker's comp funding recommendations,
3 Pension disability, economic development
4 initiatives, storm water management and
5 general exit plan provisions, revenue and
6 financial management. The design of the
7 exit plan is to ensure the termination of
8 the city's distressed status after three
9 years. This exit plan includes revised
10 baseline financial predictions for the city
11 for the period 2017 to 2020, and I think it
12 is important to hear a year later from the
13 mayor and the Pennsylvania Economy League
14 where we stand as we approach that Act 47
15 exit deadline.

16 I'd also like to make a
17 recommendation to the mayor and his
18 administration to follow what the governor
19 of Pennsylvania has been doing, Tom Wolf,
20 with something called cabinet in your
21 community. This is a new initiative formed
22 by the governor. Oh, we have to vote on the
23 motion, I'm sorry.

24 MR. PERRY: Bill was just getting
25 ahead of himself. Anyone else on the

1 question? I agree with Mr. Gaughan, there
2 is a lot of moving pieces and there's a lot
3 of enemies to leaving Act 47 so I think
4 council getting an updated by the
5 administration is very much warranted. All
6 in favor.

7 MR. DONAHUE: Aye.

8 MR. EVANS: Aye.

9 MR. GAUGHAN: Aye.

10 MR. PERRY: Aye. Opposed? The ayes
11 have it and so moved.

12 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. What I was
13 saying before I got ahead of myself there,
14 Governor Wolf has been doing something
15 called cabinet in your community and this is
16 a new initiative to provide a platform for
17 engagement between cabinet secretaries and
18 local communities throughout Pennsylvania,
19 and my recommendation to the mayor, to his
20 administration is that I think Scranton
21 should do something similar and we could
22 call it cabinet in your neighborhood and I
23 think this has been done years ago maybe
24 under Mayor Connors where you would bring in
25 the DPW director, the OECD director,

1 different members of the cabinet to
2 neighborhood meetings and a give a
3 presentation on what goes on in their
4 departments and most importantly to take
5 questions. I think it would be a great
6 opportunity to increase the civic engagement
7 and give an understand of city operations
8 within our neighborhoods.

9 I'll be attending a neighborhood
10 meeting at the end of May in the Hill
11 section, and I can guarantee you that I'll
12 receive a ton of questions about the DPW,
13 about the police department and about other
14 departments in the city and I think it would
15 a good initiative on the part of the mayor
16 to bring his cabinet people out to the
17 neighborhoods so that people get the
18 opportunity, number one, to meet them and to
19 get to know them and to ask them questions
20 and for the cabinet members to let the
21 public know what's going on in the City of
22 Scranton, so I think that is very important.

23 Councilmen Donahue also mentioned
24 something that I think is extremely
25 important and that is that the City of

1 Scranton recently issued an RFQ, a request
2 for qualifications for labor counsel for the
3 City of Scranton, and we recently had a
4 meeting with Directors Cagnetti and
5 Gilmartin about shared services between the
6 city and the school district so the first
7 area that I think we are going to take a
8 look at is if we can share labor counsel
9 services between the school district and the
10 city. I believe that it would be a way to
11 save real money and be more efficient so we
12 are looking to streamline the city and
13 school district legal structure to benefit
14 the taxpayers of the City of Scranton.

15 Some of the possible benefits that
16 we are looking at include a higher quality,
17 more consistent and joined up legal service
18 to government, better sharing of expertise
19 and good practice, building greater
20 specialism in crosscutting areas as well as
21 savings and efficiencies through the sharing
22 of common processes and the more flexible
23 and responsive use of legal resources.

24 So what are going to ask for a
25 meeting with the city administration and the

1 law department and we will ask them to hold
2 off on issuing an award for that request for
3 qualifications so that we can explore this
4 possibility, as I said, to save money.

5 We also in our meeting with the
6 school directors discussed possibly sharing
7 legal services between the council and the
8 school board with our solicitors and
9 possibly building that out as well in the
10 future to save money and become more
11 efficient, so we are looking at these
12 options and this will be one of the first
13 things that we do I think with our shared
14 services committee, and that's all I have
15 this week. Thank you.

16 MR. PERRY: Thank you, Mr. Gaughan.
17 The only thing that I want to address
18 tonight that some of my councilmen already
19 addressed and it seems like it was a hot
20 topic locally was the issue of medical
21 marijuana. Now, I have seen the benefits of
22 medical marijuana firsthand in my life, and
23 anyone who knows me knows how opposed to
24 opioids and how involved I am with the abuse
25 of opioids watching a love one die due to

1 the abuse of opioids. This is just -- it
2 makes so much sense to endorse, be a
3 proponent and encourage the use of medical
4 marijuana for the people who need it.

5 The benefits that I have seen
6 firsthand is with my wife, who is a
7 currently a cancer patient, it relieves her
8 anxiety, it relieves some pain, it helps her
9 sleep and it helps her eat which helps her
10 keep her weight on, all of the things that
11 are first and foremost in anybody who is
12 recovering and battling cancer in their life
13 and she is doing fantastic and I can't --
14 you know, seeing it firsthand it makes so
15 much sense. So, of course, you know, I like
16 many of us up here, if not all of us, are
17 for medical marijuana and definitely the
18 dispensaries, groweries and having them in
19 our city, but I'll do you one better, you
20 know, I'm in favor of actually
21 decriminalizing it the City of Scranton as
22 well. I think it ties up our police
23 officers. I think it ties up our judicial
24 system and our correctional facilities.
25 There is many other cities out there that

1 are looking at this and I think it's a waste
2 of time and waste of money to go after these
3 issues, just like prohibition was back in
4 the day.

5 Now, that opens up the door to the
6 use of the recreational in the State of
7 Pennsylvania. You want to talk about an
8 immediate revenue stream let's talk about
9 recreational marijuana. In a state that is
10 in dire need of a revenue stream, you know,
11 why is this not first and foremost in the
12 front in our communities and in our state.
13 We need to get it there in my opinion. You
14 know, it's a hot topic so there is probably
15 going to be as many people out there that
16 disagree with me that agree with me, and
17 that's okay. So let's get the discussion
18 started, let's keep it going and let's
19 benefit from what it has to give. There is
20 lot of research, there's a lot of data out
21 there so let's dig in and let's bring this
22 up to our local governments and our state
23 reps and our state senators and let's see if
24 this is an avenue that we need to take, but
25 to say that medical marijuana isn't a

1 benefit and knowing that the opioid
2 addiction and crisis is out there it just
3 very nicely doesn't make too much
4 intelligent sense, and that's all I'm going
5 to say. I'm going to go further and take
6 the road that Mr. Donahue took and I'll just
7 leave it there. That's all I have. Thank
8 you.
