4 MR. GAUGHAN: Roll call, please.

5 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Rogan.

6 MR. ROGAN: Here.

7 MS. CARRERA: Mr. McAndrew.

8 MR. MCANDREW: Present.

9 MS. CARRERA: Dr. Rothchild. Mr.
10 Donahue.

11 MR. DONAHUE: Here.

12 MS. CARRERA: Mr. Gaughan.

13 MR. GAUGHAN: Here. And please let
14 the record reflect that Dr. Rothchild could not
15 be here tonight and did inform Council last
16 week. Mrs. Reed, please dispense with the
17 reading of the minutes.

18 MS. REED: THIRD ORDER.

19 3-A. CORRESPONDENCE RECEIVED FROM
20 UFBERG & ASSOCIATES LLP DATED FEBRUARY 25, 2020
21 REGARDING CITY OF SCRANTON CONTRACT FOR
22 SERVICES LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT LAW.

23 3-B. CORRESPONDENCE RECEIVED FROM
24 CITY CONTROLLER JOHN MURRAY DATED
25 MARCH 2, 2020 REGARDING MORETTI CPA REVIEW OF

1 RETIRED CHIEF DESARNO GAS CARD.

2 MR. GAUGHAN: Are there any comments
3 on any of the Third Order items? I have one on
4 the Moretti report. Yesterday morning Council
5 received a report from a Arthur Moretti on
6 former Fire Chief Pat DeSarno's self-audit of
7 all gas card usage for the period of June, 2014
8 through November, 2019.

9 The review was to determine whether
10 Mr. DeSarno's self-audit was complete and
11 sufficient for identification of his personal
12 use of the City-issued gas card. As I said
13 last summer when these reports first surfaced,
14 the very idea of a self-audit of this situation
15 was absurd. But here we are.

16 Mr. DeSarno's self-audit concluded
17 that he only owed the City \$559.91 for his
18 personal use of the City vehicle over the span
19 of several years. Mr. Moretti's findings
20 indicate that he, in fact, should owe
21 \$5,373.61. Imagine what would -- imagine if
22 this Council did not push for a forensic audit.

23 The days of taking people's words
24 for things in City government should be over.
25 The report that's presented to Council that's

1 placed on our Third Order agenda tonight
2 presents several additional concerns.

3 During the examination by Mr.
4 Moretti, it was noted that Fire Chief DeSarno
5 received a new vehicle frequently. According
6 to the former fleet manager, the Fire Chief
7 needed no approval to receive a new vehicle.
8 That is unbelievable.

9 It was also observed that the days
10 which Fire Chief DeSarno disclosed as personal
11 on his self-audit including the July 18th, 2019
12 alleged vacation at the Jersey Shore were not
13 listed on the annual attendance controller.
14 And there were no corresponding signed absence
15 report forms.

16 Mr. Moretti noted in his report, "It
17 is important to note that in 2018 the
18 attendance controller was blank indicating that
19 the Fire Chief -- former Fire Chief DeSarno
20 took no time off during the year and only five
21 days in 2017. It is likely that any vacation,
22 personal or sick days not included on his
23 attendance controller were not deducted from
24 his accrued benefit time balance which is
25 generally paid out to the employee upon

1 separation from employment.

2 This would result in an
3 overstatement of unused benefit time and a
4 significant amount of unentitled payout." Mr.
5 Moretti goes on to state that, "For the purpose
6 of this engagement I did not quantify the
7 amount.

8 However, I recommend that the City
9 of Scranton inquire with the former Fire Chief
10 as to why these days are not included in the
11 annual attendance controller. I further
12 recommend that the City of Scranton review
13 policies, procedures and controls surrounding
14 the use and approval of accrued benefit time to
15 ensure that all employees have the utilized
16 time off properly deducted."

17 Based on these findings, there are
18 some important questions that I am going to
19 make a motion to pose in Fifth Order tonight in
20 writing to the administration and they are as
21 follows:

22 Has Fire Chief DeSarno received any
23 payout from unused benefit time and, if so, how
24 much and how was this calculated? Based on the
25 Mayor's -- the Mayor came to our -- stopped by

1 our caucus earlier tonight.

2 It's my understanding and they
3 reported that he has not. But I would like
4 this confirmed in writing.

5 My second question is what steps
6 will the administration take to recoup the
7 \$5,373.61 that Mr. Moretti reports former Fire
8 Chief DeSarno owes the City? We were told
9 tonight by the Mayor and her team that they are
10 going to take steps to recoup that money.

11 I'm also going to ask the
12 administration provide the attendance
13 controllers or the attendance reports for
14 cabinet members who served under former Mayor
15 Bill Courtright for the year 2014 through 2019.

16 I'm also going to ask what are the
17 current policies, procedures, and controls for
18 the use and approval of accrued benefit time to
19 ensure that all employees have the utilized
20 time off properly deducted. What are the
21 current policies, if any, for asset procurement
22 in the City?

23 I did ask about the funding for the
24 fleet coordinator position which was budgeted
25 in the -- in this year's budget. That has not

1 been filled yet, but they are working with the
2 labor Council to sort that out.

3 Also, I brought this up last week, a
4 GPS system that I think would help a lot in
5 terms of transparency, accountability and
6 efficiency. And the Mayor assured us again
7 tonight that they are taking steps -- the steps
8 necessary to institute that policy.

9 The report presented to Council that
10 is in Third Order tonight represents gross
11 incompetence and complete mismanagement from
12 the previous administration. To say that the
13 former Mayor and others were asleep at the
14 wheel is the understatement of the century.

15 It highlights a mindset in the City
16 that City exists to serve -- that the City
17 exists to serve employees rather than
18 taxpayers. And this needs to stop. This
19 specific issue that was reported in
20 Mr. Moretti's findings related to vacation and
21 sick days needs to be investigated further.

22 In addition to requesting this
23 additional information from the administration,
24 I'm also requesting that Mr. Moretti come
25 before the Council to present his findings on

1 this specific report and answer any and all
2 questions that the Council has.

3 Are there any other comments on the
4 Third Order items? If not, received and filed.
5 Do any Council members have any announcements
6 at this time? I have a few.

7 First, I'd like to acknowledge the
8 retirement of Captain Dave Schreiber who last
9 week worked his last shift following more than
10 a 31 year career with the Scranton Fire
11 Department. Congratulations and best wishes
12 for a well-deserved retirement.

13 I wish to personally thank you for
14 your service and dedication to the City of
15 Scranton and its residents. And I would also
16 like to extend my deepest sympathies on the
17 passing of your father. As I mentioned at the
18 beginning of the meeting, Mr. Fred Schreiber
19 was also a retired Scranton fireman.

20 This Sunday, March 8th begins
21 Daylight Saving Time. As you turn your clocks
22 ahead one hour, please remember to test and
23 change the batteries in your smoke alarms and
24 carbon monoxide detectors. It is a simple but
25 life-saving step that we should all be reminded

1 of.

2 Due to the many road closures in the
3 area surrounding the 300 and 400 blocks of
4 North Washington Avenue as a result of the
5 presidential visit this Thursday, March 5th,
6 City Hall will close to the public at 1 p.m.

7 Due to a lack of a quorum on March
8 17th, Council will reschedule that meeting to
9 Monday, March 16th at 6:30 p.m., and we will
10 have a caucus as usual at 5:45 p.m. And I
11 would just request that speakers state their
12 name when they get up to speak for the record.
13 Mrs. Reed?

14 MS. REED: FOURTH ORDER. CITIZENS
15 PARTICIPATION.

16 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. The first
17 speaker tonight is Joan Hodowanitz.

18 MS. HODOWANITZ: Joan Hodowanitz,
19 City resident and recovering property taxpayer.
20 I sold my apartment. Free at last, free at
21 last, thank God, I'm free at last. The LST, I
22 saw that four citizens including our friend
23 Marie filed objections to the tripling of the
24 tax.

25 And I'm not sure when a decision

1 will be made but I do hope that the
2 administration is considering a Plan B if they
3 happen to lose that argument.

4 With regard to Chief DeSarno, you
5 know, it's not that I don't trust the man. I
6 trust him as far as I could throw him. So I
7 decided I'm going to do to Chief DeSarno what I
8 did to Mayor Courtright. This is IRS Form
9 3949A. It's an information referral. And its
10 purpose is to report allegations of tax law
11 violations by an individual which could include
12 public or political corruption by a public
13 official.

14 So I'm going to take the Moretti
15 report and a few of the articles from the
16 newspaper and attach this form, and tomorrow
17 I'm going to be mailing this into the IRS. I'm
18 not quite sure whether I need to do a similar
19 one for other department heads during the
20 Courtright era because I get the impression
21 that, you know, that was a general tenor of
22 the way things were done. We'll see whether
23 there's any reason to go down that road.

24 The article on Mr. Kyle Armbruster
25 who pled guilty to felony DUI, I understand

1 he's not yet been sentenced. And apparently
2 he's still employed by the City according to
3 Acting Chief Al Lucas.

4 If that, in fact, is true, that just
5 irritates the blank out of me. I am really
6 unhappy with that. Now, the only thing I could
7 imagine is that we're waiting for him to be
8 sentenced just in case he decides to pull back
9 his guilty plea and, you know, throw himself --
10 I didn't do it.

11 But apparently he pled guilty to
12 crashing head-on into another car which carried
13 a family of four including two children. And
14 if this man is sitting home on the taxpayer's
15 dime with full benefits until he gets
16 sentenced, not right. So I'll also be crafting
17 a letter to the editor tomorrow just to vent on
18 that.

19 You know, I mean, if that's the way
20 our system works, our system is broken and we
21 need to fix it. I just -- not right. I saw --
22 I read the article on Mayor Cagnetti's press
23 conference on the 27th. I kind of like the way
24 she's heading and her transparency and openness
25 to the public.

1 But I was intrigued by what she said
2 about ethics or this is what the paper wrote,
3 "The administration is reviewing the City's new
4 ethics code adopted last year and its policies
5 and procedures as well as what works in other
6 cities and what's needed in Scranton.

7 I got to tell you, okay, there's a
8 time to poop and get off the pot. This ethics
9 code is over a year old. If there is anything
10 wrong with it -- and it's only 28 pages long.
11 It's not that hard to digest. It's written in
12 English, you know. Then propose amended
13 changes and get it over with.

14 If not -- if you're not going to do
15 that, comply with the provisions of the code
16 including the statements of financial interest
17 that need to be submitted to the City Clerk and
18 made available for inspection and published on
19 the City's website. What about the adjusted
20 political campaign contribution limits?

21 MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah, so I got -- we
22 did receive a response from the Business
23 Administrator and the administration. They --
24 the Business Administrator has calculated the
25 adjustment. He sent it to the Law Department

1 for review and we should be receiving that
2 soon.

3 MS. HODOWANITZ: Okay. And there
4 are other things that need to go on the
5 website. Nothing is on the website, plain
6 English explanation of the provisions of
7 Sections 12 and 7. I wrote that when I was on
8 the board. It's not on the website.

9 The contribution limits need to be
10 published on the website. So you need to get
11 them on. But like I said, poop or get off the
12 pot. I'm tired of waiting.

13 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. The next
14 speaker is Lee Morgan.

15 MR. MORGAN: Good evening, Council,
16 Lee Morgan.

17 MR. GAUGHAN: Good evening.

18 MR. MORGAN: Today I dropped a
19 request off to Council and the Mayor's office
20 and I requested a response from the Council and
21 the Mayor's office. And I requested to place
22 questions on the ballot in November, 2020. And
23 the letter reads:

24 I, Lee Morgan, request the City of
25 Scranton to place on the ballot the following

1 two questions to be placed before the voters in
2 the November, 2020 election.

3 Question one, abolish the Home Rule
4 Charter in the City of Scranton.

5 Question two, reclassify the City of
6 Scranton from a Class 2A city to a Class 3
7 city. And I continue by saying I, Lee Morgan,
8 have only created a bare outline of these two
9 questions that I would ask to be placed on the
10 ballot. And I'm looking to see if the
11 Administration and the Council would be willing
12 to place the questions of this type on the
13 ballot for the benefits of residents of this
14 City.

15 Or if the Administration and the
16 Council refuse, then it would be -- it would
17 force a petition drive. I await your response
18 in writing at your earliest convenience.
19 Please direct any correspondence in regard to
20 these questions at my address below.

21 Now, I think that for too long we
22 played silly little games in this City. And I
23 would like to ask the residents of the City to
24 go to the Scranton Public Library and read the
25 recovery plan that Mayor Dougherty submitted to

1 the City.

2 And then also keep in your mind that
3 the PEL said the City could have filed
4 bankruptcy in 2012. And we have an
5 administration that has filed an appeal to the
6 Court to try to collect taxes off residents in
7 the City when they've been told that they're
8 millions and millions of dollars over the caps.

9 And then they're using their own --
10 our own money against us. And the City has
11 just been so mismanaged for so long that even
12 the public school system has collapsed.

13 And, you know, when you look at kids
14 not getting preschool and the condition of the
15 Scranton School District and the City, I mean,
16 we're standing here and we're talking about a
17 former chief of the fire department.

18 But you know the thing we're not
19 talking about is, allegedly when the Mayor was
20 arrested for his corruption, we're not talking
21 about the sale of the Scranton parking garages
22 to a nonprofit and moving debt around. We're
23 not talking about any of the real issues
24 resolving around this City.

25 Nothing, it's all just smoke and

1 mirrors. And you know something, the sale of
2 the Sewer Authority, the pensions underfunded,
3 I'm going to do a lot more requests.

4 I was thinking about doing a Right
5 To Know but, you know, that would be a waste of
6 time. So I found somebody that has the ability
7 to audit the City. And I'm going to request
8 from the Mayor all the financial records of
9 this City for the last 40 years.

10 I'm going to retire next year. And
11 I'm thinking that I want to take some attorneys
12 downtown and see what they have and if the
13 American people have to put up with this
14 corruption forever because the two party
15 political system is broken in this country.

16 And the founders never wanted us to
17 live the way we do under this kind of tyranny
18 because that's exactly what this is. People
19 can't afford their property taxes. They can't.
20 The City is blighted from one side right to the
21 other. And we're talking about a former chief
22 when the Mayor was playing fast and loose
23 selling all of our assets and the Council was
24 ramming it through and just giving everything
25 away.

1 The pool in -- the pool on Capouse
2 Avenue has been closed for decades, never
3 fixed. Where's all the -- where's all the
4 grant money going? You spoke about ECTV being
5 funded by the City. You should bring the
6 documentation into this chamber and tell the
7 residents of this City how much money they
8 received from that franchise fee.

9 And let people really know what's
10 taking place here because, you know something,
11 this isn't a, you know, a little game and a
12 show. These people in this City are so beaten
13 down and so overtaxed and then the Mayor brings
14 out and hires a law firm to say, hey, this is a
15 home rule community.

16 We could tax people until they --
17 it doesn't even matter. We can just keep
18 taking off them. It's beyond ridiculous and
19 it's time for something to change.

20 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Next
21 speaker is Les Spindler.

22 MR. SPINDLER: Good evening,
23 Council, Les Spindler, City resident,
24 homeowner, taxpayer. First of all, 7-B this
25 woman Marie Banicky -- I hope I'm pronouncing

1 her name right. She presented \$500 to the
2 police K-9 Unit. That's a great cause. It was
3 a wonderful thing she did. I'm a dog lover so
4 these dogs are a great asset to the City.

5 Every year at the National Night Out
6 I go all the time just to see those dogs do
7 their thing. They do a great job. And it's a
8 wonderful thing this woman did.

9 Next thing, last week we talked
10 about dangerous dog legislation which I've been
11 talking about for years. Councilman Gaughan, I
12 want to thank you for asking the Solicitor to
13 look into different cities that have it. It's
14 been a long time. So hopefully something could
15 be done with this. And do you know if he has
16 found anything out yet?

17 MR. GAUGHAN: He did issue a memo to
18 Council regarding that topic today. I haven't
19 had the chance, nor do I think any of the
20 Council had the chance to review it. But I
21 will put that in the Third Order next week so
22 that it's available to the public.

23 MR. SPINDLER: Since the big topic
24 tonight is the Fire Chief and I saw it was the
25 headline in the paper today -- and I agree with

1 what some of the other speakers said.

2 I don't think the chief should have
3 to pay a penny back. There's no policy in
4 place when he did what he did. He had
5 permission from the Mayor. That was in the
6 past. I don't think that the new
7 administration should be able to do anything
8 about it.

9 If there was a policy in place, I'd
10 say all well and good. Nothing saying he
11 couldn't do what he did. So I hope he hires a
12 good attorney. I think the City will be in for
13 another lawsuit.

14 Next thing, this parking downtown,
15 every week I hear more and more complaints
16 about it. And now I have one. They took every
17 darn free parking spot away from the whole
18 City. You can't drive into town and stop and
19 run into a place for five minutes without fear
20 of getting a ticket.

21 I drive to town every month to pay
22 my Times-Tribune bill. There used to be three
23 or four parking spots there to pay your bill or
24 do whatever you want. Those spots are gone.
25 In front of restaurants, Pappas Pizza down the

1 block here, free spots gone. Buona Pizza on
2 Lackawanna Avenue, free spots gone.
3 Something's got to be -- whoever did that deal,
4 there should have been an amendment in there
5 that all the free parking spots in the City are
6 kept. It's ridiculous. And they are hurting
7 business in the City.

8 Nobody wants to come to down and try
9 to go into a place without fear of getting a
10 ticket. You know what, if I ever do, I'll take
11 my chances in front of the magistrate and just
12 tell the magistrate what I'm saying to you
13 people because I think I would -- I know I
14 would win.

15 I've gotten tickets in the past and
16 I've never lost a case in front of the
17 magistrate. So anybody's listening, go in and
18 get your pizza, whatever. If you get a ticket,
19 go to the magistrate and tell them what this
20 parking authority did or whatever their name
21 is. I don't even know what their name is.

22 But I think Council should look into
23 it legally and see if we can change that
24 contract to get our free parking spaces back.
25 Like I said, it's hurting businesses downtown.

1 And it's not what we wanted. We want people to
2 come downtown and spend their money, not be
3 afraid of getting a ticket. So I hope Council
4 if there is a contract, look and maybe we can
5 since it happened during prior administration,
6 maybe we can get it changed. Thank you for
7 your time.

8 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Next
9 speaker is Norma Jeffries.

10 MS. JEFFRIES: Good evening,
11 Council. Before I get started with what I
12 really wanted to say tonight, I just wanted to
13 share with everyone I attended the Saturday is
14 Mayor's Day of Service. And I am officially a
15 2020 census ambassador.

16 So I've been in different blocks
17 that I've been assigned and I've been talking
18 to the residents of those blocks where I'm
19 assigned to. But one of the things I wanted to
20 share and I share with everybody is the money.
21 The money, there is 675 billion with a "B"
22 dollars that are at stake.

23 So, like, I was talking to a group
24 today. Fill out that census when it comes.
25 It's just so very, very important. And you

1 could do the census online or fill out the
2 paper. So, you know, April 1st is census day.
3 And I'll be talking with everybody. And I'm
4 just hoping that everybody will jump on that so
5 that we can help our schools. We can help our
6 street. And we can help our highways. So
7 that's the first thing I wanted to say. It was
8 a great day on Saturday.

9 But I also wanted to continue
10 talking about KS Engineering. And I thank you,
11 Bill, for following up on the grant money
12 because that is a nice piece of money if we can
13 get that grant and find out where that is.
14 But, you know, as I read that letter I kept
15 getting more and more questions.

16 And the one question I -- I don't
17 think you answered for me was the \$2,600 that
18 was supposed to be for a database management
19 system that was supposed to start on January of
20 2020 this year.

21 So I'm hoping that that's not really
22 going into placement. And if it is, what's
23 that \$2,600 a month for?

24 MR. GAUGHAN: That's a maintenance
25 fee for the system. So that's a maintenance

1 fee to maintain the system, keep the system up.
2 So you're paying monthly for the technology.

3 MS. JEFFRIES: Okay. And that's
4 what I kind of thought. But then I thought and
5 I said, okay, I hate to keep going back when I
6 worked, but, you know, that stuff sticks with
7 you when you work.

8 When we worked on projects, the
9 project person would come back to us and they
10 would say here's the product. And he would sit
11 around a table like this and the K & S
12 Engineering would show us what they did. And
13 we would talk and say did it fit our needs --
14 did this project fit our needs.

15 Okay, and then the vendor would give
16 us the details, give us the manual with all the
17 instructions and everything on how to work this
18 new product. We would say, oh, yes. Okay,
19 that's good. We got what we wanted. So I'm
20 thinking, well, did K & S come here and do
21 that? Who was on the team?

22 When the bill was turned over to pay
23 this two thousand -- two hundred and
24 seventy-eight thousand dollars to K & S, they
25 gave us a bill. They gave us a product. That

1 product now that we're paying \$2,600 a month to
2 maintain.

3 So I just want -- I'm saying this
4 because I just don't understand what we're
5 maintaining it for because I understand that
6 we're short on people in that organization.
7 There is only 1.5 people working that. So I
8 said, okay. So then I went to the budget.

9 So on my kitchen table I started
10 looking at the budget to see if there was any
11 allotment in the 2020 budget to add personnel
12 to that organization. So far I haven't been
13 able to find it. The only thing I did find in
14 the budget was something that referred to the
15 professional services budget.

16 I guess the professional service
17 budget group deals with these kinds of things.
18 It says, "The professional services budget will
19 decrease with the completion and partial
20 payment for the Traffic Sign Management System.
21 The budget will continue to be expansive
22 because of this collective nature for many
23 related costs associated both current and
24 proposed capital projects -- I have no idea
25 what that is -- generally, these costs support

1 related engineering and design services for
2 professional contracts, not specifically
3 imbedded into the various departmental
4 budgets."

5 So I said, okay. So then I started
6 looking in the budget to see who is this
7 professional services budget. Is there a line
8 item in the budget for that? I didn't get all
9 the way through it. There's a hundred and
10 some-odd pages of the budget. So I haven't
11 gotten finished with that.

12 So that's where that letter led me
13 to this because I wanted to know then if that
14 budget has been decreased, why couldn't that
15 money be used for additional personnel? And
16 then who -- I got four seconds. And then who
17 puts the wheels in motion to get the additional
18 personnel because there is no sense in having
19 this management database if it's just sitting
20 there if we don't have the personnel.

21 MR. GAUGHAN: Right. I could answer
22 your question. So I would put it in terms of
23 so -- I think one of your questions is
24 regarding, like, the platform, the technology.
25 So I look at it this way. The Granicus

1 platform that we have here that we upload all
2 the legislation so that the public can look at
3 online, we pay a service fee for that
4 technology. I think it's \$10,000 a year
5 roughly.

6 So we pay for that technology every
7 year. If for some reason it goes down they
8 will help us with it. They provide a training
9 to us, same thing happened with the Sign
10 Management Program. So we pay a fee to use
11 that program and that database. Now, within
12 the DPW, the sign department, there's only two
13 employees.

14 I agree with you that there should
15 be more. Unfortunately, in the environment
16 that we're in with the budget, it's difficult
17 to add positions like that. But I know that's
18 one of the goals moving forward is that when we
19 can add to that department we should because I
20 think that's important.

21 But we've been told by the DPW
22 Director is that they're working very
23 diligently to move through each section of the
24 City. That company identified signs you
25 couldn't see at night, signs that were in poor

1 condition.

2 And they're, you know, methodically
3 moving through the City to change those and to
4 replace them.

5 MS. JEFFRIES: You know, no fault
6 against the City workers because you said
7 there's only 1.5 of them and there is 26.11
8 miles in the City of Scranton --

9 MR. GAUGHAN: Right.

10 MS. JEFFRIES: -- they have to
11 cover. So it's nothing against them. It's
12 just that I just hope that maybe in 2021
13 budget, we can add to the head count and get
14 another person in there to help those two that
15 are there.

16 MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah, and at one time
17 there used to be multiple employees in the Sign
18 Department. But over time like I said through
19 different administrations over the past few
20 decades, they've had to cut those positions
21 because of the budgetary concerns. But
22 hopefully that answers your question.

23 MS. JEFFRIES: That's all I have.

24 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Norma.

25 Next speaker is Bob Bolus.

1 MR. BOLUS: Council, Bob Bolus,
2 Scranton. Mr. Gaughan, I have a lot of
3 questions here tonight. One is, why did you
4 call Chief DeSarno a disgrace over the
5 discrepancies in the figure he calculated under
6 one policy?

7 You have Arthur Moretti, a private
8 accountant hired by the City being paid by
9 taxpayer dollars. How much is that costing us
10 and why is it necessary when the account was
11 told to follow different guidelines for
12 appropriate use of the numbers that were
13 different.

14 You got to remember something.
15 Mr. DeSarno followed the guidelines given to
16 him by the former Mayor. No other Mayor
17 stepping in can go retroactive. He wasn't
18 accountable to anybody in any way, shape, or
19 form. And the fact that he's being disgraced
20 and humiliated publically -- as a fellow
21 firefighter I think is an absolute injustice
22 that's being done by this Council, especially
23 by you.

24 There's a binding contract. It's
25 oral. You have an attorney there. He'll tell

1 you what an oral contract stands for. What the
2 Mayor told him he could do wasn't for private
3 use. He was on a 24-hour call as a servant of
4 the City and needed to be where he needed to
5 be.

6 And that was what was given for that
7 service. You owe Chief DeSarno his backpay.
8 You don't have a judgment. You have no type of
9 litigation here that said you could take his
10 money. You have to pay him. Write him his
11 check out. And if you don't like it that way
12 then file a lawsuit against him and go to
13 court.

14 But you cannot take an escrow money
15 from anybody no matter who you guys think you
16 are. If you intend to do that and this legal
17 matter pursues, I'm personally funding his
18 litigation against you and the City, okay? You
19 could bet on it.

20 Was Armbruster a disgrace? That was
21 a personal matter. Look at what that
22 firefighter did, three DUIs, hit and run,
23 everything else that went on. But yet Chief
24 DeSarno isn't a personal matter? You want to
25 make it public, yet Armbruster isn't. And look

1 what we're doing here. He's still on the fire
2 department. It's -- (inaudible.)

3 You know, why don't you call him a
4 disgrace, Armbruster? Why aren't you calling
5 him a disgrace? He disgraced our firefighters
6 in uniform, the fire department in Scranton and
7 yet he's still around. Yet, I don't see you
8 doing that. What about Pat Hinton? You were
9 about ethics.

10 Yet, you let him get away with what
11 he's doing at the Nay Aug Parking Authority --
12 or Recreational Authority with the coffee shop.
13 You turned around and you allowed him to put in
14 for containers being called structures.

15 You put it in order. Yet, I haven't
16 seen you enforce removing the containers in the
17 City of Scranton. Yet, you want to make laws.
18 I'm involved in litigation in Nay Aug Park. I
19 brought it before Council. You want to allow
20 Geisinger, a bully with money to take 280
21 parking spaces in Nay Aug for a dollar a day,
22 100,000 a year when they should be paying 6 or
23 700,000 a year.

24 The kiosks up there are \$2 an hour.
25 They get two hours. Yet, I don't see you

1 saying a word about that or moving to disband
2 the Recreation Authority and take care of the
3 people.

4 You voted for \$500,000 increase to
5 the City residents and crucify our senior
6 citizens, yet, you won't do anything to get the
7 money back from Geisinger. That's appalling as
8 far as I'm concerned. You know, put the Rec
9 Authority under the umbrella of the City of
10 Scranton. Let the Mayor handle it. You know,
11 it just turns to a point that it just turns my
12 stomach.

13 You got Mr. Rothchild here who is
14 professing to be a doctor. I'd like to know
15 what type of doctor she is or he is, okay?
16 Can -- prescribe medication, do surgery or is
17 it just because it's a physical therapist and
18 misrepresenting to the people? They're
19 pro-choice her and Mayor went to a pro-choice
20 rally in Wilkes-Barre.

21 I'm pro-life. And I'm offended by
22 them going there saying they represent the City
23 of Scranton. What they want to do with their
24 own personal name is their personal business.
25 But when you say you're a Councilman or a Mayor

1 of the City of Scranton at a pro-choice, you're
2 representing the people in the City and that's
3 not going to be tolerated.

4 I'm against murdering and butchering
5 babies, number one. And number two, you were
6 supposed to get a letter from the authority,
7 the Parking Authority which you lied about
8 sending. I'd like to know when you're going to
9 get that letter and tell us where our 500
10 parking spaces are. Got it? And this isn't
11 over. I'll be back.

12 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Yep.
13 Welcome back. Next speaker is Lenny Srebro.

14 MR. SREBRO: Good evening, Council,
15 Lenny Srebro, Keyser Valley resident. Well,
16 Kyle, you were out. You looked around. And
17 you seen what the neighborhood is dealing with.
18 Thanks for coming out. Got anything to tell
19 me?

20 MR. DONAHUE: I haven't gotten an
21 update yet. But as soon as I do I'll -- I'm
22 hoping in the next week or so.

23 MR. SREBRO: Okay. Let me ask you,
24 how about this grant money? I don't
25 understand. I'm sorry I'm kind of dumb about

1 how everything goes on. But isn't there money
2 available from the grant to take care of the
3 flooding problem or to help the flooding
4 problem?

5 MR. GAUGHAN: I sent you an e-mail.
6 Did you get -- I don't know if you got it.

7 MR. SREBRO: I'm sorry. Say that
8 again?

9 MR. GAUGHAN: I sent you an e-mail.

10 MR. SREBRO: I did get it. That's
11 right. You know, see, this is -- the way that
12 I see it, you know, it's the same old, okay, we
13 see there is a problem and we're looking into
14 it and five years now, Bill --

15 MR. GAUGHAN: I know.

16 MR. SREBRO: -- you know, I've been
17 coming up here, okay. All right. You know, I
18 have a suggestion. I saw it. It was only one
19 time, a commercial on TV or -- I mean, an
20 article about how Wilkes-Barre or Luzerne
21 County is going after the construction
22 companies when they dig up a road, you know,
23 they want them to make it, you know, a good
24 job, you know, to patch the road back up.

25 I'm sure we've all been where they

1 dug up the road and left it a mess. You know,
2 why can't Scranton do the same thing, you know,
3 make the construction companies do a good job
4 of patching it up instead of -- some of what I
5 see, you know, cars break things, you know,
6 from going over these patch jobs.

7 Or, you know, when I see something
8 really rough, you're darn right I slow down and
9 if I could, I go around that patch. And if
10 there is traffic coming the other way, you
11 know, it could result in a problem. But I know
12 that it's Wilkes-Barre or Luzerne County is
13 insisting now that they want a decent job of
14 patching.

15 I mean, all my life I worked on
16 cars. If I did a job like that and handed you
17 back your car that it's falling apart, you
18 would say something or you'd refuse it. So
19 it's something to think about.

20 Okay. And I'd like to say that I'm
21 an example of what Mr. Lee Morgan was talking
22 about, you know, that I feel like I'm being
23 taxed to death. You know, a couple years ago
24 when my home burned, you know, I was undecided
25 whether I wanted to rebuild in the City of

1 Scranton because the taxes are so high.

2 Well, my taxes went up by \$4,000.

3 You know, I'm 66. I'm retired. That's my only
4 income. How am I going to afford this? Now, I
5 do have an appeal coming up, you know, but I
6 know it's still going to be a really big
7 increase.

8 And then I live in a flood zone to
9 add \$4,000 to my tax bill and the new house is
10 built on the same platform, the same footprint
11 as the old house. So, you know, yeah, I feel
12 like I'm getting screwed, like I said, you
13 know, for all of these taxes I got to pay.

14 Okay, well, since we don't know
15 nothing about the flooding problem except today
16 my garage got flooded. So if you are not in a
17 flood zone, count your blessings. Thanks.

18 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. There are
19 no other speakers listed on the sign-in sheet.
20 Would anyone else like to address Council?

21 MR. COYNE: Tom Coyne. Just to
22 refer to the last statement there coming down
23 Pittston Avenue right in front of the old
24 Sunoco gas station right where Pittston Avenue
25 hits South Side, we have a nice little pothole

1 digging out there. What's it from? It's from
2 a utility patch that sunk. I mean, I've had to
3 dodge it about six or seven times on that
4 roadway in the past month.

5 MR. DONAHUE: I'm sorry, which one
6 are you --

7 MR. COYNE: Pittston Avenue in front
8 of the Sunoco -- where the old Sunoco station
9 used to be, which is --

10 MR. DONAHUE: I know exactly where
11 you're talking about. And I actually put one
12 in because I hit it every day too. So I put --

13 MR. COYNE: -- all of a sudden, it's
14 like I'm there again for it.

15 MR. DONAHUE: When they're in that
16 area they are going to put some cold patch down
17 for the time being.

18 MR. COYNE: -- it is a utility
19 patch. Same with the -- because the trucks up
20 near the post office, the corner up near around
21 the post office is like going over a rumble
22 track. I asked last week about the -- I had a
23 question last week about the trash.

24 I'm not sure that you got back to me
25 on that. It was on whether or not the other

1 recycling companies in the City had been
2 contacted because any recycling that they do
3 for material can be put into a grant fund as
4 well. I'm not sure if you reached out to them
5 yet.

6 MR. DONAHUE: We have. So there's
7 a recycling committee. I'm trying to dig into
8 and figure it out exactly how -- what kind of
9 contract we have with them. And it's a
10 municipal agreement between municipalities all
11 throughout Lackawanna County. So Lackawanna
12 County runs it. But then there is a municipal
13 agreement with each municipality.

14 MR. COYNE: I'm talking about
15 there's up on the Morgan Highway there's a
16 recycling company, a private company. There's
17 a number of private companies out there that if
18 you recycling inside the City of Scranton and
19 if you could get their figures, that could also
20 put in towards the grant.

21 MR. DONAHUE: I'm looking into
22 seeing at what -- yes. Yes, you are right
23 there. Yes.

24 MR. COYNE: Is it possible to get a
25 contract of the trash agreement, the landfill

1 trash agreement because I believe Jimmy Connors
2 it was signed under, the last one that we're
3 stilling running under.

4 MR. GAUGHAN: Yeah, we should be
5 able to get that for you.

6 MR. COYNE: That would be lovely.
7 And as of this current Fire Chief, I do beg to
8 differ. If there is -- in looking at the
9 documentation, I understand if the Mayor said
10 you're working 24/7. You're on call all the
11 time. You have used up all your time that is
12 allotted to you by personal and vacation and
13 sick, therefore, we're going to extend you
14 extra days as you need it because you're
15 working 24/7, that's a different situation.

16 But being able to bank all of your
17 time without using it, without claiming it is
18 an issue. And if it is pattern and practice
19 that time is being taken off and not reported
20 as payable to the City's payroll reduced off
21 their benefits, then they should not be here.

22 It should be taken -- I would
23 actually tell them not to come in here and talk
24 because the City should go after them for theft
25 by deception because they have stolen from the

1 City taxpayers and the City coffers by
2 intentionally defrauding the government by
3 falsifying their timesheet and time record.

4 It's not an accident if you could
5 prove that it's pattern and practice. If it
6 was done for a number of years where they did
7 not take days off, you know, on the books that
8 they were off and they are collecting from that
9 afterwards. That is a rigged system to defraud
10 the City of money by collecting funds that they
11 are not legally entitled to. It's fraud.

12 And at that point it shouldn't be
13 come and explain yourself. It should be enjoy
14 the handcuffs and we'll recoup it through a
15 criminal procedure because that's what it is.
16 Unless you put teeth behind this, unless you
17 say when you steal from our government by
18 deception, we are not going to say, bad boys.
19 You shouldn't do that. You're going to have to
20 give us the money back.

21 And we go, you're going to go in
22 jail and you're going to risk your pension. At
23 that point people stop stealing from the City
24 because the few dollars that they may be able
25 to stuff in their pocket isn't worth the jail

1 time and isn't worth the loss of a pension.
2 That's the best teeth you have to stopping
3 people from robbing the City. Thank you.

4 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Would
5 anyone else like to address Council?

6 MS. SCHUMACHER: Marie Schumacher,
7 7-A, do we know when -- what the termination
8 date is of this project that you are going to
9 be voting on tonight?

10 MR. GAUGHAN: Termination date of
11 the project in terms of the remediation? Is
12 that what you are referring to?

13 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yes.

14 MR. GAUGHAN: So Leslie Collins from
15 Scranton Tomorrow came in along with Josh Mast
16 from Scranton Tomorrow and Charlie Jefferson,
17 the developer. And Leslie Collins reported to
18 us that there is no exact timeline yet. That
19 will be developed once the contract is executed
20 and they are able to get on site. You're
21 looking at me like I have ten heads. But
22 that's the answer I was given.

23 MS. SCHUMACHER: That just doesn't

24 --

25 MR. GAUGHAN: Oh, it makes sense.

1 MS. SCHUMACHER: It's not the way to
2 do business to me.

3 MR. GAUGHAN: No, that is usually
4 how they do it. They couldn't give an exact
5 timeline. They have to come in and be on site.
6 They have a lot of review periods to go through
7 with the state. So they can't give an exact
8 timeline.

9 MR. DONAHUE: And, of course, that
10 is weather permitting too.

11 MR. GAUGHAN: And the weather has to
12 do with it as well.

13 MS. SCHUMACHER: A lot of that has
14 been done and then that should have been
15 preceding the submittal of the proposal.

16 MR. GAUGHAN: No.

17 MS. SCHUMACHER: Everybody that
18 wanted to vote on that should have been
19 afforded an opportunity to come in and survey
20 the site.

21 MR. GAUGHAN: No, when I say review
22 periods, there are specific review periods from
23 DEP and other governmental entities that any
24 bidder would have to go through. So it's hard
25 to give a timeline -- like I said with the

1 weather and these other reviews that you have
2 to go through.

3 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay.

4 MR. DONAHUE: Because -- and I think
5 my understanding is as the work's being done,
6 DEP has to come in and review the work being
7 done. So they can't give DEP a schedule until
8 they get the work done. And then that's when
9 they invite them in and that's all weather
10 permitting.

11 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, we know how
12 well they do too. Mr. McAndrew, you have the
13 public safety, right?

14 MR. MCANDREW: Right.

15 MS. SCHUMACHER: Have you had a
16 change to review the contracts yet?

17 MR. MCANDREW: No, I have not.

18 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Mr. Perry is
19 not here anymore. I would really like to know
20 if the contracts say public safety personnel
21 have to live within the boundaries of the City.

22 MR. GAUGHAN: Well, Solicitor Hayes,
23 that would be in the Home Rule Charter,
24 correct?

25 MS. SCHUMACHER: Is it in the Home

1 Rule Charter?

2 MR. GAUGHAN: It is in the Home Rule
3 Charter, yes.

4 MS. SCHUMACHER: Then why do we have
5 a firefighter who lives in Throop? Now, this
6 was brought up --

7 ATTY. HAYES: They have six months
8 to obtain residency.

9 MS. SCHUMACHER: He's only been a
10 firefighter for less than six months? This --

11 MR. GAUGHAN: Who are you referring
12 to?

13 MS. SCHUMACHER: Let's see -- April
14 10th of last year was the offense committed.
15 So he was already on duty then. That's longer
16 than six months.

17 MR. GAUGHAN: And, Solicitor Hayes,
18 can you address this? I think she's referring
19 to Kyle Armbruster, article in the paper.

20 ATTY. HAYES: Oh, they have six
21 months to obtain residency. So if that --
22 that's the requirement.

23 MS. SCHUMACHER: But it's been
24 longer than six months.

25 MR. GAUGHAN: So then that would be

1 the job of the City Controller. And right now
2 it's my understanding that this is a personnel
3 issue.

4 I've asked about this before if
5 you're referring to the fireman that -- Kyle
6 Armbruster, is that what you're referring to?

7 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, well -- yes.
8 How -- who's responsible for doing this? Is he
9 the only one?

10 MR. DONAHUE: So it is the county --
11 or it is City Controller. And I know he's
12 going through a process now. And he's already
13 identified ones where he's sent out request for
14 them to prove that they do live in the City.

15 And a part of that process now is if
16 you rent, your landlord has to sign a notarized
17 document. If you buy -- if you own a house,
18 your lender has to sign a notarized document.
19 And if you don't have a lender, that's on the
20 deed.

21 MS. SCHUMACHER: And that isn't a
22 policy?

23 MR. DONAHUE: That was a policy that
24 was just established by the new City Controller
25 moving forward. And he's going through the

1 process now of reviewing all those. I know
2 that for a fact because I had a long discussion
3 with him about that about two weeks ago.

4 MS. SCHUMACHER: And is Human
5 Resources in charge of the policies and
6 procedures?

7 MR. DONAHUE: -- it's up to the City
8 Controller.

9 ATTY. HAYES: That's right. The
10 City Controller -- Mr. Donahue, the City
11 Controller is responsible for enforcing the
12 residency requirement.

13 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay.

14 MR. DONAHUE: So there are steps
15 being taken.

16 MS. SCHUMACHER: Okay. Who holds
17 the policies and procedures for the City? Are
18 they developed by Human Resources and all -- I
19 mean, every place I've ever worked they are all
20 in a 3-ring binder, 3 inch, 3-ring binder.

21 ATTY. HAYES: Which specific policy?
22 There are policies for every department.

23 MS. SCHUMACHER: Yeah, policies for
24 every department how they're supposed to
25 operate, job descriptions.

1 MR. DONAHUE: That was actually
2 touched on in our caucus with Mayor Cagnetti
3 when she came in. And if they are not all in
4 one specific place -- and I know that they are
5 working on that to get that all into an
6 employee handbook like you're talking about so
7 that it's all out there.

8 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Have a
9 good night.

10 MS. SCHUMACHER: Thank you.

11 MR. GAUGHAN: Is there anyone else?

12 MR. DOBRZYN: Good evening, Council,
13 Dave Dobrzyn, resident, taxpayer. In two more
14 days our fine president will be in town. And a
15 little word to the wise, he probably hasn't
16 compensated more than 100 cities and possibly
17 200 cities for the additional police
18 protection.

19 Last week there was a mention about
20 animal control. Try to do for these animals
21 what you can. And one of the things that Billy
22 Courtright did do right was he came up with St.
23 Cats and helped these people get started.

24 They're up at the zoo. It costs \$35
25 for neutering and a rabies shot. And it's a

1 really good thing -- and Griffin Pond has some
2 economic problems aggravated by no kill. So
3 that's something else to keep in mind. I would
4 hope that we continue to support them.
5 Hopefully we can afford it.

6 And last week I made mention of
7 school lunch. Well, I was very pleased to hear
8 that in Scranton School District they're given
9 breakfast and lunch free. And that should be
10 for all students, by the way. And in other
11 school districts, there's school lunch shaming.

12 And I hope that people would not
13 support that. Every kid should be taken care
14 of in school. And that's all there is to it.
15 They can't possibly learn on an empty stomach.

16 Now, for instance, in New York we
17 see a lot of ads by Mr. Bloomberg about what
18 kind of politician he was and he got medical
19 care for people and he did all of this. Well,
20 he was only Mayor of New York. And by the way,
21 there is 55,000 kids that attend school in New
22 York City from a homeless shelter. So that's
23 how bad things have gotten.

24 And on these 511 taxes, Plan B, go
25 ahead. Raise my property taxes over LST losses

1 and thanks to all that are responsible for
2 challenging them.

3 We have 36 percent tax exempt
4 buildings, another 10 percent that pay -- don't
5 pay their taxes. Either they're unable or they
6 just don't feel like it like Mr. Bond.

7 And that means that 54 percent of
8 the people in this town, properties and
9 businesses pay for the rest. And it's not
10 acceptable. And it's not right. So -- and the
11 biggest reason we lost in court was, of course,
12 somebody had to pay \$156 out of \$150,000 salary
13 or 175 living in Abington, a judge.

14 And it's they don't have the right
15 to vote, well, that's okay. I don't have the
16 right to vote out 36 percent tax exempt
17 buildings no matter how poor of a reason
18 they're here. It's just shameful.

19 Once again, that lot -- I think
20 we're just going to have to see each other in
21 court. My second property, it's next door.
22 I'm going have to challenge it and hire a
23 lawyer and probably all I'll get out of it is
24 my taxes after the 511 tax is tossed out.

25 And we have to enact Plan B. Well,

1 Plan B will be to raise the taxes back to what
2 they were. But at least it won't be what they
3 would possibly be if I didn't challenge it.

4 So one of the things that kind of
5 bothers me about that is we came up with that
6 land bank. And we're handing these lots away
7 for a song and a dance. And they're paying
8 taxes on them accordingly. And, you know, the
9 guy that's been around for 15 years -- and by
10 the way, that property did not pay 10 cents in
11 property taxes from 1962 to 2002. So that's
12 something to think about. Have a good night.
13 Thank you.

14 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Have a
15 nice night. Would anyone else like to address
16 Council? Mrs. Reed?

17 MS. REED: FIFTH ORDER. 5-A.
18 MOTIONS.

19 MR. GAUGHAN: Mr. Rogan, do you have
20 any motions or comments tonight?

21 MR. ROGAN: Yes, just one item I
22 want to comment on. A few months back Council
23 introduced legislation regarding an emergency
24 certificate to appoint Stevens and Lee to
25 handle on a no bid basis the 511 appeal.

1 At the time I voiced my concern
2 about that and my opposition. I was also a bit
3 surprised that legislation was sent from the
4 administration to Council because frankly,
5 Council -- although I don't agree with it has
6 no say in the emergency certificate process.

7 It's signed off by the Mayor. And
8 it's signed off by the City Controller which it
9 had been in this case. So we did introduce
10 legislation. And it was tabled for the past I
11 think three, four weeks now. Again, I was
12 anticipating that we would be voting on it at
13 least to give our opinions.

14 But now I'm being told it's not
15 going to come up for a vote. So I do want to
16 address it briefly and bring up my opinion. We
17 did receive a summary budget from Stevens and
18 Lee, a couple different scenarios.

19 And it looks like it's going to be
20 between 200 and \$400,000 awarded on a no bid
21 basis. Again, I strongly oppose the way that
22 this was handled. I know that former Mayor
23 Evans had the appeal ready to be filed.

24 I agree that we should pursue
25 outside counsel. This case is extremely

1 important. And I think outside counsel is the
2 way to go. But I firmly believe that this
3 could have been filed and then the bidding
4 process could have been carried out.

5 I know there's a ton of talk about
6 \$5,000 from Chief DeSarno which again, that's
7 also a lot of money. But we're talking about
8 \$400,000 here on a no bid basis. And the
9 results of this case as Mr. Dobrzyn and others
10 mentioned is going to affect everyone.

11 So I just want to state I'm
12 disappointed we're not going to have a vote. I
13 knew it was strictly symbolic. But I do want
14 to state my opposition to the process that was
15 used for Stevens and Lee to obtain this
16 contract.

17 Again, it was entirely legal. But I
18 don't think it's the right way to do business
19 especially for an issue this large. I do also
20 want to mention on the 511 taxes and also on
21 some of the filings that were put in this week
22 as far as opposing some of the other taxes that
23 are currently in place, and everyone loves to
24 say, oh, the City shouldn't be taxing this or
25 taxing that.

1 But at the end of the day it costs a
2 certain amount of money to run the City of
3 Scranton. Should it be less? It should. Our
4 budget cannot be cut magically by 30 percent.
5 I wish it could be. But that's not the case.

6 And as one of the speakers correctly
7 just mentioned, if the City were to lose these
8 cases that appeals have been filed and
9 objections have been filed in, the result
10 unfortunately is going to be a large property
11 tax increase for residents.

12 For instance, the LST tax that is
13 rightfully partially paid by people who live
14 outside of Scranton but work in the City who
15 use our services when they're here daily
16 provides a significant amount of income to the
17 City.

18 If that tax were not in place, that
19 revenue would have to be made up again from
20 property taxes. So for anyone who thinks that
21 if the City loses these cases they're going to
22 see a net benefit, that's not the case. If you
23 live in the City and you own a property, your
24 taxes are going to go up.

25 If you're a renter when your

1 landlord's taxes go up, you know when your
2 lease renewal comes up what he's going to do.
3 Your lease payment is going to go up.

4 So I did want to just point those
5 out that the outcome of these cases are very
6 important to everyone, whether you own a
7 property, whether you don't own a property. At
8 the end of the day, it's the property owners
9 and the renters that are going to be paying the
10 bill.

11 But again, I just want to state my
12 opposition to how the Stevens and Lee contract
13 was obtained. And that's all. Thank you.

14 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Mr.
15 McAndrew, any motions or comments?

16 MR. MCANDREW: I have two comments.
17 First of all, last week we wished the Lady
18 Invaders luck. I'd like to now congratulate
19 the Lady Invaders of West Scranton on their
20 district championship win.

21 And I would also as Chairman of
22 Public Safety, I would also like to
23 congratulate and send best wishes to Captain
24 David Schreiber of the Scranton Fire Department
25 on his retirement of 31 years of service to our

1 City. That's all I have.

2 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you. Mr.
3 Donahue, any motions or comments?

4 MR. DONAHUE: Yes, just quickly.
5 Mrs. Reed, before I forget, would you be able
6 to send a request to the recycling coordinator
7 and the recycling consultant asking if they've
8 reached out to the independent recyclers to add
9 their number into our recycling number?

10 Also, would we be able to send a
11 request to the administration for an update on
12 the Serrenti project? Also one of the requests
13 I'd like to send to the administration, I
14 talked about this with the Mayor before is a --
15 since we're into a campaign season this year, a
16 reimbursement policy.

17 It's a problem on both sides of the
18 aisle. There were six rallies held in the City
19 of Scranton in 2016. And we got zero dollars
20 reimbursed. So one of the things I would like
21 to add in that reimbursement policy is to try
22 to see if we can get campaigns to be required
23 to sign a contract before the City provides any
24 assistance to make sure that they actually, you
25 know, are forced then to pay up. And that's

1 all I have for tonight. Thank you.

2 MR. GAUGHAN: Thank you, Councilman
3 Donahue. A few things, first of all, Bob Bolus
4 got up tonight and said so many things that
5 were false or misrepresented that it would take
6 me a long time to go through each one of them.
7 And I don't think that's the purpose of the
8 Council meeting.

9 And it's one of the reasons I didn't
10 respond to him when he was standing there. But
11 one thing that he did say I do want to reply to
12 that I said Pat DeSarno was a disgrace. I did
13 not say that. I said the situation was a
14 disgrace. And it is a disgrace. Any -- raise
15 your hand if you worked for a company in your
16 lifetime and you were allowed to use your
17 personal vehicle to take it to a trip to the
18 shore. Anybody? Raise your hand.

19 I don't see any hands raised. I
20 certainly for the company and the school I work
21 for cannot take a company vehicle and drive it
22 to the Jersey Shore or take it for my own
23 personal use and then do a self-audit and say I
24 only owe 500 and some dollars.

25 It is absolutely ridiculous. And

1 it's wrong. I don't care if it was Pat
2 DeSarno, Joe Smith, Bob Jones from Main Avenue.
3 It doesn't matter to me. Take Pat DeSarno out
4 of the equation. It's a person that was in a
5 position of public trust under the Courtright
6 administration who took a personal vehicle and
7 took it to the shore and used it for his own
8 personal use. That is wrong.

9 Councilman Rogan mentioned \$5,000.
10 To a lot of people \$5,000 is a lot of money.
11 And I bet you every person in the City of
12 Scranton wishes that their company gave them a
13 car so they could drive it around whenever they
14 wanted to and pay for the gas without paying
15 the gas tax. I'm sure that would be great.

16 As I mentioned at the start of the
17 meeting, this is a mentality that exists in
18 this City that this building and this
19 government works for the employee and not for
20 the taxpayers. And unfortunately, for the
21 first five -- or six years that I was on
22 Council under the Courtright administration, it
23 was a zoo.

24 Apparently people were allowed to do
25 whatever they wanted, gross incompetence, gross

1 mismanagement. And I have no problem pointing
2 it out when I see it because that is my job.
3 And unfortunately for the first few years, I
4 was one of the only people on Council who was
5 asking questions of the former administration
6 and was repeatedly stonewalled. And look at
7 where we are today, unfortunately.

8 So I just think that when no one in
9 an administration is watching the store, this
10 is what happens. And if it wasn't Pat DeSarno,
11 it would be -- maybe be somebody else. And I
12 think any cabinet official under the Courtright
13 administration or any employee for that matter
14 who abused a gas card or abused vacation or
15 sick time if that was the case, there should be
16 appropriate measures taken.

17 So with that being said, I would
18 like to make a motion that this Council send
19 correspondence to the administration asking the
20 following questions:

21 Number one, has Fire Chief DeSarno
22 received any payout from unused benefit time
23 and, if so, how much? And how is this
24 calculated? And this was a question that the
25 administration -- the Mayor who was in the

1 caucus had answered. They said that there was
2 no payout. And I did relate to the Mayor that
3 I would like that in writing and she said that
4 would not be a problem.

5 Number two, what steps will the
6 administration take to recoup the \$5,373.61
7 that Mr. Moretti reports former Fire Chief
8 DeSarno owes the City.

9 Number three, please provide the
10 attendance controllers or reports for cabinet
11 members who served under Bill Courtright for
12 the year 2014 through 2019. Reason I make that
13 is, if one cabinet member, you know, didn't put
14 a vacation or a sick day apparently down for a
15 whole year, was there any other cabinet members
16 that did that as well? I'd like to take a look
17 and compare the documents.

18 Number four, what are the current
19 policies, procedures and controls for the use
20 and approval of accrued benefit time to ensure
21 that all employees have the utilized time off
22 properly deducted?

23 What are the current policies for
24 asset procurement in the City? And the last
25 two questions I did have here were answered

1 about the fleet coordinator position and the
2 GPS system. So there's a motion on the floor.
3 Is there a second?

4 MR. DONAHUE: Second.

5 MR. GAUGHAN: On the question?

6 All those in favor signify by saying aye.

7 MR. MCANDREW: Aye.

8 MR. DONAHUE: Aye.

9 DR. ROTHCHILD: Aye.

10 MR. ROGAN: Aye.

11 MR. GAUGHAN: Aye. The ayes have it
12 and so moved. The other thing I wanted to
13 mention in terms of the Stevens and Lee budget
14 that we received, so Stevens and Lee was
15 selected as has been reported through an
16 emergency procurement process permitted under
17 the Code by the Mayor and her administration.

18 It was one of the first acts that
19 Mayor Cagnetti took when she took office. The
20 Mayor determined that an emergency existed.
21 And Council had no say in the selection of
22 Stevens and Lee. However, upon our request we
23 asked for a budget because this -- and I
24 personally was concerned.

25 I know my Council members were

1 concerned about giving a law firm a blank
2 check. Stevens and Lee complied with our
3 request. And they did provide a detailed
4 breakdown and different scenarios with the
5 budget which will be placed in Third Order for
6 public review next week.

7 So this is obviously a tremendous
8 expense. But the City must do everything in
9 its power to exhaust all potential appeals to
10 ensure that this disastrous ruling does not
11 remain in place.

12 And in terms of, you know, no bid
13 contracts, no one up here is in favor of no bid
14 contracts. We had no say in that as I
15 mentioned. But what is the alternative here, a
16 50 million dollar judgment?

17 Show me the tree where -- the money
18 tree where you could find that amount. I don't
19 see it. Show me where you could cut in the
20 budget to come up with that amount. I don't
21 see it. The City has no choice but to fight
22 this case. And I believe that Stevens and Lee
23 based on the executive session that we had last
24 week has the team in place to do that and to
25 fight on the City's behalf.

1 In terms of the way it was handled,
2 I can't speak for the administration. But I
3 know from being on here -- from being on
4 Council for six years how long the process
5 takes for an RFP. It takes a month, two
6 months, a bid opening.

7 There's a process. So I don't know
8 how that could have been done in that short
9 amount of time. And I think that's why it was
10 relayed that the emergency existed.

11 The other thing I wanted to mention
12 was John Basalyga did respond to Council's
13 request for information. We just received
14 that. And I have not had a chance to fully go
15 through it yet. But that will also be placed
16 in Third Order for next week.

17 And I do want to thank the Mayor for
18 coming to our caucus tonight in regards to the
19 whole gas card issue. The Mayor and her Chief
20 of Staff made it very clear to Council that
21 they are taking this whole thing seriously.
22 They are going to continue to develop policies.

23 And they are going to start holding
24 employees accountable. One of the things that
25 was brought up tonight about the Human

1 Resources Department and an employee handbook
2 and it was also brought up in the caucus, this
3 is something that was -- is in the Recovery
4 Plan.

5 For six years it was an item. And I
6 sat at PEL meetings when it was brought up that
7 we needed to retool the HR Department and come
8 up with a comprehensive handbook and look at
9 the policies and procedures. It was never
10 done.

11 Again, when someone's not minding
12 the store and is off doing other things and we
13 all know what that was, this is how things
14 become mismanaged. And I'm sorry, but it's
15 wrong. And until you have more than one person
16 holding people accountable, this is what you
17 end up with unfortunately. And that's all I
18 have for tonight. Thank you.

19 MS. REED: 5-B. No business at this
20 time.

21 SIXTH ORDER. 6-A. No business at
22 this time.
